The Republicans, at the Chicago Convention last week nominated on first ballot William Howard Taft, of Ohio, as their candidate for the presidency of the United States. His career has been summed up as follows:

"William H. Taft was born in Concinnatti, Ohio, on Septemper 15th, 1857. He grew up in his native city and was prepared for college in the schools of the city, and entered Yale in 1874, from which institution he graduated four years later with second honors in a class of 121 members. After graduating he entered a law school and in 1880 was admitted to the bar for practice of 1908 and ratified January 21st, his adopted profession.
