"Sanitary Sunday" is announced by the tuberculosis and health authorities for Sunday, Nov. 28. Dr. Charles A. Julian, Assistant Secretary for tuberculosis in this State...

There is now being conducted a campaign of education for the study and prevention of tuberculosis in this State. Scientists now believe that the disease can be checked, and not only checked but obliterated and effaced from the earth...

I have been a ranger in Texas and have been a deputy sheriff in California. I have violated the law and want to pay the penalty." He accepted the sentence without a word.

Glenn Counsels Resort to Guns. Memphis Dispatch, 2nd.

"If I were governor of Tennessee, if I were sheriff of Shelby county, or if I were mayor of Memphis, I would see to it that open saloons were not run in Memphis contrary to the prohibition laws. I would put a gun in the hands of every worthy citizen and tell him to shoot and shoot to kill until I forced respect for the law." This startling declaration was made today by Governor Glenn, of North Carolina, at the Convention of Sunday School Workers of the Christian Workers. He declared it was folly to say a law cannot be enforced when the sentiment of the community was against it.

Reports say that forest fires have been raging for 50 miles along the head waters of Green River in Buchanan and Pendleton counties, West Va., and that millions of feet of lumber are being destroyed. A lumber town Wotoga, was entirely wiped out by the flames.

The Charlotte Observer says that in that city of 46,000 population, there has only been 30 cases of typhoid fever since June 1. They attribute this to the strict sanitary laws, pure water, etc.
