## A Tribute of Respect to Rev. David Greene.

There are none so wise as to comprehend or explain fully the ways of God. It is, nevertheless, a stern reality that His ways are done according to His own perfect wisdom. In His dealings with mankind He uses man as an instrument to carry out His designs. When He proposes to extend His kingdom the works assigned to a man of His own choosing.

More than 25 years ago the Holy Spirit impressed Brother David Greene that there was a work in this community for the Master. About the year 1884 he began preaching and conducting revival services at the Austin school house. With his love for Christ and his great soul-aching for sinners, he pleaded fervently with men to turn and accept the Savior; the Lord heard the cry of His servant and blessed his efforts.

After a few years work of this kind a number of persons signified their readiness for a church. In 1891, assisted by Elders J. J. L. Sherwood and A. J. McBride, Brother Greene organized Pleasant Grove Baptist church with twenty-eight members. At its organization the church called him as pastor, and for 18 consecutive years he served this church with the greatest harmony. During this time he baptized 176 persons and at his death the church had a membership of 140. This church attributes its growth and prestige to his tireless energy and perseverance.

In his death we, as a church, mourn in the loss, but we know that God will care for His own and that the unfinished work will be done. As a church we recognize the faithfulness of our beloved pastor. He adhered strictly to his calling; duty was never forsaken for the pleasures of home or friends. Heat nor cold never detained him; disappointment made him more zealous, and the thirst for souls increased his courage. This faithfulness was exhibited to the end. In his last message, realizing the end near, he exhorted us to love and fear God.

Truly it may be said that Brother Greene had few equals as an advisor. By his pious life and loving disposition he was able to reach men. Although vested with little training in school, he became a ripe scholar; the unlettered understood and the learned admired him; the young convert sought his admonition and the mature christian loved his counsel. In fact, the inquirer was enthused and satisfied with the throbbing love that flowed from his great soul.

We would say further that any home was benefited by his visits. Among the poor he was an inspiration; among the great he was agreeable. A good talker, possessing a fine humor, the old, the young, the untutored and the wise loved his company. No home was too scantily furnished, no home was too luxurious for him to visit. Under every circumstance he was a man of the people. In discipline he was strict, honest and courageous; vice in the church was crushed in unmistakable terms; wickedness was exposed; duty and right knew no compromise, and God's Word was his guide. In all this he was reasonable and kept within the law as given in the Bible. This Book was his rule, its precepts were final.

Finally we esteem him as a spiritual power. The Father of all endowed him with earnestness, with zeal and with perseverance. Few men have moved and influenced others as he did.

This power was given him by God, for devotion to his cause. Indeed a man of power is gone; a servant of God has departed; a prince in Israel has fallen, but the luster of a glorious character and a triumphant life will shine on and on to a perfect day.
