TOKEN OF LOVE AND ESTEEM.

At the business meeting of the Edenton Street Epworth League last night in the league room there was enacted a most beautiful and touching scene, and one that is not on the program of the league meetings.

In the presence of a large number of league members Rev. W. A. Stanbury, who has been pastor of Edenton Street church since last June, was presented with a handsome gold watch. Engraved in the back of the case are the words:

"From Edenton Street M. E. Church."

There was an unusually large crowd of leaguers present and the quiet of the league meeting seemed the most fitting time for the presentation. In no department of the church work perhaps has Mr. Stanbury taken deeper interest or come closer to his members. It is with deep regret that the league sees him go to his new field of work at Tarboro.

Mr. Joseph G. Brown presented the watch in his usual graceful way, but underlying his tactful words was a current of deep feeling that expressed the sentiments of the whole church. For during his short ministry here Mr. Stanbury has made his way into the hearts of the people and won their respect and esteem by his courage, faithfulness, cheerfulness, and loyalty.

It would be impossible to quote Mr. Brown's words here or Mr. Stanbury's response, for both were from the heart, simple and earnest.

To relieve the tension of feeling Mr. Brown presenting the watch, referred in a roundabout way to Mr. Stanbury's approaching marriage, saying that his congregation felt he needed to be "watched" and that he hoped it would keep him from embarrassment in the future and enable him to be on time, particularly on an important event.

Mr. Stanbury said he felt that it was one time when "silence was golden" and the few words he said left no doubt in the minds of those present of his grateful appreciation of the love and thought expressed in the gift. He thanked them for their kindness to him since he came among them and their loyalty in sustaining all he attempted to do. He felt, he said that some of the best people in the world would be found right there in Edenton street church. He asked their prayers in his new church, that his one mission might be that of saving souls.

When the meeting broke up Mr. Stanbury was surrounded by eager friends wishing to bid him farewell. He will leave in a few days for his work at Tarboro.

Mrs. W. L. Winkler.

Mrs. W. L. Winkler, nee Miss Daisy Gragg, died at Cedar Valley, Caldwell county, Nov. 24, 1909.

This was, indeed, a sad death, and brought sorrow to every one who knew her. Born Aug. 6, '87, having lived only 22 years, 3 months and 5 days. But few young women have done more in so short a time.

At nine and a half years she professed religion and joined the church at Three Forks and lived a consecrated life thereafter. She had a great desire to get an education. She came to Boone and entered the Appalachian Training School, where she stayed until graduation. She was a splendid student, obedient and kind. She had fine musical talent, and was organist at the Baptist church in Boone.

It was only a year ago that she was married to Prof. W. L. Winkler. Both being teachers, they started a fine school in Caldwell county, and Mrs. Winkler was at her chosen work when death came as a result of typhoid fever.

She bore her sickness with very great patience, and expressed a willingness to pass over the River of Death, if it was the will of her Savior.

When the news of her death came to her former home in East Boone deep sorrow and genuine sympathy pervaded the entire community. When the remains passed through town school was suspended; work stopped. Short exercises were conducted by the Rev. Harrison Farthing, amid a great concourse of people, including relatives and friends, teachers and school mates, we have not witnessed a more touching scene.

Four miles east of Boone, on a bold eminence, overlooking the sparkling New River, is her grave. The hearse was followed by class mates, teachers and friends. They went to show their last respects to one they honored and loved. "Daisy Gragg," as she was most generally known, will not soon be forgotten. She will be remembered for her character, her intellect and her culture. She lived an exemplary life and has gone on to receive her reward.

We extend the profoundest sympathy to her father and mother Mr. and Mrs. Richard Gragg and to her two sisters, and to her sorrow-stricken husband, Prof. W. L. Winkler.
