Turn on the Light.

Before the Congressional investigating committee Senator Gore has testified that Jacob Hammon, formerly national committee man from Oklahoma, offered him \$25,000 if he would withdraw his opposition to the McMurray Indian lands contracts. Representative Creager of Oklahoma, has testified that to him also Hammon made corrupt overtures to the same end.

To this testimony has been added that of D. C. McCurtain, a Choctaw Indian and delegate to Washington for the tribe, who charges that D. F. McMurray, the Oklahoma attorney, in 1906 offered him \$25,000 if he would not oppose McMurray's contracts with the Indians. His father, Green McCurtain, principal chief of the Choctaws, has told the committee how George W. Scott, who he believed was acting in McMurray's behalf, offered him one-fourth of the profits from the present McMurray contracts if he would withdraw his protest against them.

The Choctaw and Chickasaw Indians own 450,000 acres of coal, asphalt and timber lands, for which a syndicate is said to be willing to pay \$30,000,000. Presumably they are worth much more. McMurray has secured about 10,000 individual contracts with Indians, allowing him 10 percent commission on the sale of the lands. His fees would amount to \$3,000,000. He is playing for a big stake, and apparently, from the presence of influential attorneys or lobbyists in Washington he has not lacked assistance.

The Indians need pay no fees to my attorney to sell their lands. The government is their rightful agent in any sale and it can be trusted to safeguard their interests. President Roosevelt disapproved a previous lot of McMurray's contracts with the Indians. President Taft, according to Senator Curtis, of Kansas, who on April 1 by request called at the white house with Vice President Sherman, formerly chairman of the house committee on Indian affairs, and advised against the present McMurray contracts, has shown no inclination to favor them.

Representative Bird McGuire, of Oklahoma, however, has testified that he assured McMurray in Washington that he had not opposed the contracts and agreed to tell President Taft that the entire Oklahoma delegation was not opposed to them. It was at Representative McGuire's suite in a Washington hotel that Hammon, who Senator Gore accuses of attempting bribery, stayed last spring. McMurray has also been his guest in Washington. Representative McMurray admits:

On the stand Senator Gore quoted Hammon as saying that Vice-President Sherman and other persons of influence were "interested" in the McMurray contracts. Senator Gore disavows having made any charge whatever against Mr. Sherman. That Hammon may have used his name without justification is quite possible. Hammon was republican national committee man from Oklahoma when Mr. Sherman was chairman of the republican congressional committee. Mr. Sherman is entitled to the full benefit of the doubt as matters stand. At the same time it is unfortunate that his name should figure in another scandal. When Mr. Roosevelt wrote his letter to Mr. Sherman denouncing E. H. Harriman it was only after Mr. Harriman had refused to make a campaign contribution and that

fact had been reported to Mr. Roosevelt by Mr. Sherman.

But the main course of the investigation cannot be affected by such circumstances. The inquiry into the whole scheme of selling the Indians' lands must be prosecuted with the sole purpose of ascertaining the full truth. It is not a question of personalities or politics. A colossal fraud has been attempted at the expense of the Indians. Reputable witnesses on the stand have charged that devious and corrupt methods have been attempted with the purpose of consummating the fraud. The congressional investigating committee must lay bare all the facts. It must go to the bottom of this grave national scandal.

The Hookworm Disease.

Hookworm disease is a condition brought about by the presence of a small worm in the bowels, which holds fast by its head and draws blood for its nourishment, and injects a poison into the system, which gives rise to headaches, nervousness, dizziness, pale ness, weakness, drowsiness, and a general dwarfed condition both mentally and physically. Hookworm disease is found South of the Potomac and Ohio Rivers for the reason that it is too cold in the north and too dry and cold in the west. In these we have plenty of moisture and warmth and infected individuals to cause the disease to spread.

Last year 600 college students were examined for hookworm disease, with the result that 33% per cent. were found to be infected. These students represented four of our best state colleges and the majority of counties.

Last week many of our soldiers in camp at Chattanooga were examined, with the result 30 per cent. were found to be infected.

This parasite does not multiply in the stomach, but does lay eggs in sume which escape with the excreta and in from five to nine days they develop into infecting embryos.

These embryos do not develop any more until they enter the skin of an individual, when they give rise to a condition known as "ground itch," "cow itch," or "dew poison," this being first symptoms of infection.

The embryos make their way from this point through our lymph and blood circulation to our lungs, and then to our throat when they are swallowed go to our bowels and develop into adult worms. This takes about six weeks.

The treatment is simple and effective.

The disease is both easily and preventable, especially by using sanitary privies, a description of which may be had by writing to the State Board of Health and cured by your family physician.

The Twinkling of a Star.

The twinkling of a star has never been explained to the satisfaction of all investigators, but it is generally to be due to controlling causes within the earth's atmosphere. That the cause may be looked for within the earth's atmosphere.
