The action of the State Republican convention yesterday leaves no room for doubt as to what the issue in the campaign this year is to be. The election of Congressman Morehead and the incorporation of a "local self government" plank in the platform can be credited to no other than ex-Senator Marion Butler for so late as last week Butler declared that he had been organizing the State for Morehead since January. The record of Marion Butler since his advent into the political arena will answer the question whether or not he was actuated by an unselfish purpose. First a Democrat, then a Populist later a Fusionist and finally a Republican, he has filled his sails with every promising breeze, and when it suited his purpose has deserted friends and allies to further his own interests. Witness his base betrayal of Democracy, in spite of his fervent assurance to the late Senator Vance his violation of faith after he had been elected to a long term in the Senate, with Judge Pritchard; his mysterious abandonment of Populism; his vile design to force North Carolina to pay millions of dollars for bonds fraudulently issued by a confederate that robbed the State right and left in its day of sore distress. And Butler, twenty years ago an obscure lawyer now a millionaire, comes back to North Carolina with the purpose of inflicting himself again upon a betrayed people and gratifying his own inordinate craving for political preferment. Butlerism has struck North Carolina more than one deadly blow. It has produced chaos in the State; it has sown seeds of class feeling that will never cease to curse the common wealth and has fathered iniquitous legislation upon which the State yet reflects with a shudder. Are the people of North Carolina willing to restore Butler to power, where with all his craft and cunning he will stop at nothing in order to perpetuate his reign?

The Power of Heredity.

In his splendid charge to the grand jury last Monday morning, Judge W. R. Allen said among other good things, that no man can know how far rearing heredity is. None can tell to what extent the parent leaves an impression on the child not only in its moral nature as well. That is a true statement but Judge Allen brought most interesting facts to support that statement, facts which made every man in the crowded court room stop and think. Judge Allen cited the case of Max Dukes, a drunkard, and a common bum, a noted character for thriftlessness and intemperance. This Max Dukes was born in 1720. Of his descendants 1,200 have been identified and of these, 310 were inmates of poor houses, 440 were viciously diseased, 50 were prostitutes, 7 were murderers and 60 were thieves. On the other hand there was Jonathan Edwards the distinguished minister of the gospel, who was born in 1703. Of the descendants Jonathan Edwards, 1,594 have been identified and of these 295 were college graduates, 65 were professors in colleges, over 100 were preachers, over 100 were lawyers, 60 doctors, 75 in the army and navy, 135 were authors, 48 were editors, 3 United States Senators and 15 were railroad presidents.
