Notice to Parents.

The compulsory Attendance Law requires that all children between the ages of eight and fourteen years be in school continuously for four months in the year. Only two unexcused absences within four weeks are allowed. A teacher may excuse on account of sickness, accidents, poverty, storms, or a distance of 1 1/2 miles or more from the school house. In the future no parent will be permitted to keep his child out of school without a lawful excuse. Teachers must make weekly and monthly reports of absences to the attendance officer. Teacher who fail forfeit five dollars of their salary a month. This Sept. 4, 1916.

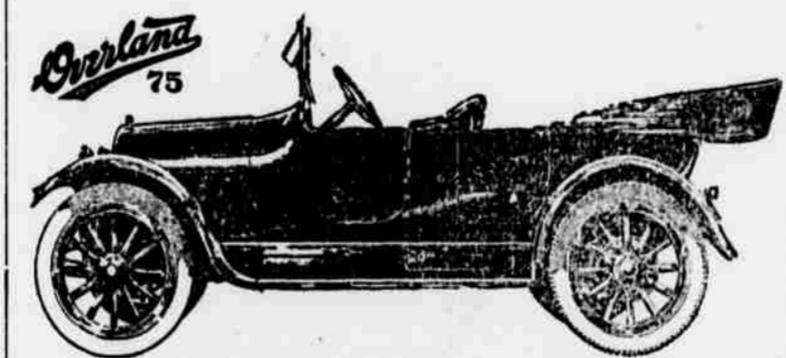

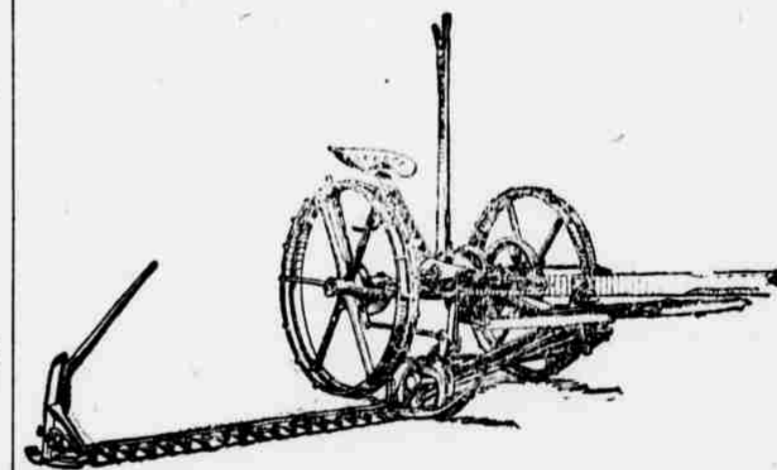
