

The 75-Million Dollar Campaign in Watauga.

To the Baptist Churches of the Three Forks and Stony Fork Associations:

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS:

The following amounts have been reported up to Sunday night, Dec. 7, as totals for our 75 Million Campaign: For the Three Forks Association \$23,595.64. I am of the opinion that there will be 1,800.00 yet to come. Boone church reported the largest subscription to date—\$3,977.39, with Bethel a close second, with a subscription of \$3,429.95. Several churches have doubled their quotas, and only six have reported the quota not met, and one made no contribution at all. I hope to give the full amount that each church subscribed just as soon as the reports come in.

The Stony Fork Association reported \$2,275.00, with six churches not reported at all. Mt. Vernon church raised \$300.00 for the first year. Please accept my hearty thanks for your co-operation and help. The Three Forks Association to date reports more than \$6,000.00 above her quota, while Stony Fork more than doubles hers. A full and detailed report will appear just as soon as it comes in. This is the largest giving in our history.

5. That a county commencement be given on the second Saturday in April 1920 at Valle Crucis, if the people there want it, if not at some other place in the county. All suggestions to be sent to Wiley G. Hartzog, Boone. The committee will be glad to hear from all teachers and any other person who have a word for the commencement.

The committee suggests that the first examination be given in schools that close in December by the middle of January. Those running later give the examinations in March.

We hope all teachers will encourage the students to take the examinations for we know they will be of interest to the students and for the betterment of the schools of the county. Other counties are doing it.
