

Chattanooga Architect Visits Boone

Mr. C. W. Carlton, Architect, of Chattanooga, Tennessee, came to Boone last Friday to meet the building committee of the Methodist church. The committee made a contract with Mr. Carlton for plans and specifications for the new church building.

The building planned combines use, beauty, and economy. With normal growth Boone and the Training School, the building will serve admirably for at least twenty-five years.

The pews in the auditorium proper seat 285. Back of these pews are six class rooms, and in the gallery are seven class rooms and in the gallery are seven class rooms. By using these and putting in extra chairs there can be placed in easy sound and sight of the pulpit 750 people. Back of the pulpit are choir and organ space, ladies' parlor and pastor's study.

Under the auditorium, on the ground floor are an assembly room, eleven class rooms, furnace room, storage room. In the dome is a room to hold 150 men. Every foot of space in the building can be used.

I quote from the Reverend D. M. Litaker, one of our best church builders:

"You can get 50 per cent more building in this plan for the same money than with any other plan in use. This plan of building is grand in its looks because of its perfect proportions. It does not have to have ornaments to make it look good. It is commanding in its classic beauty just from its perfect lines of architecture."

Call for Election in Town of Blowing Rock

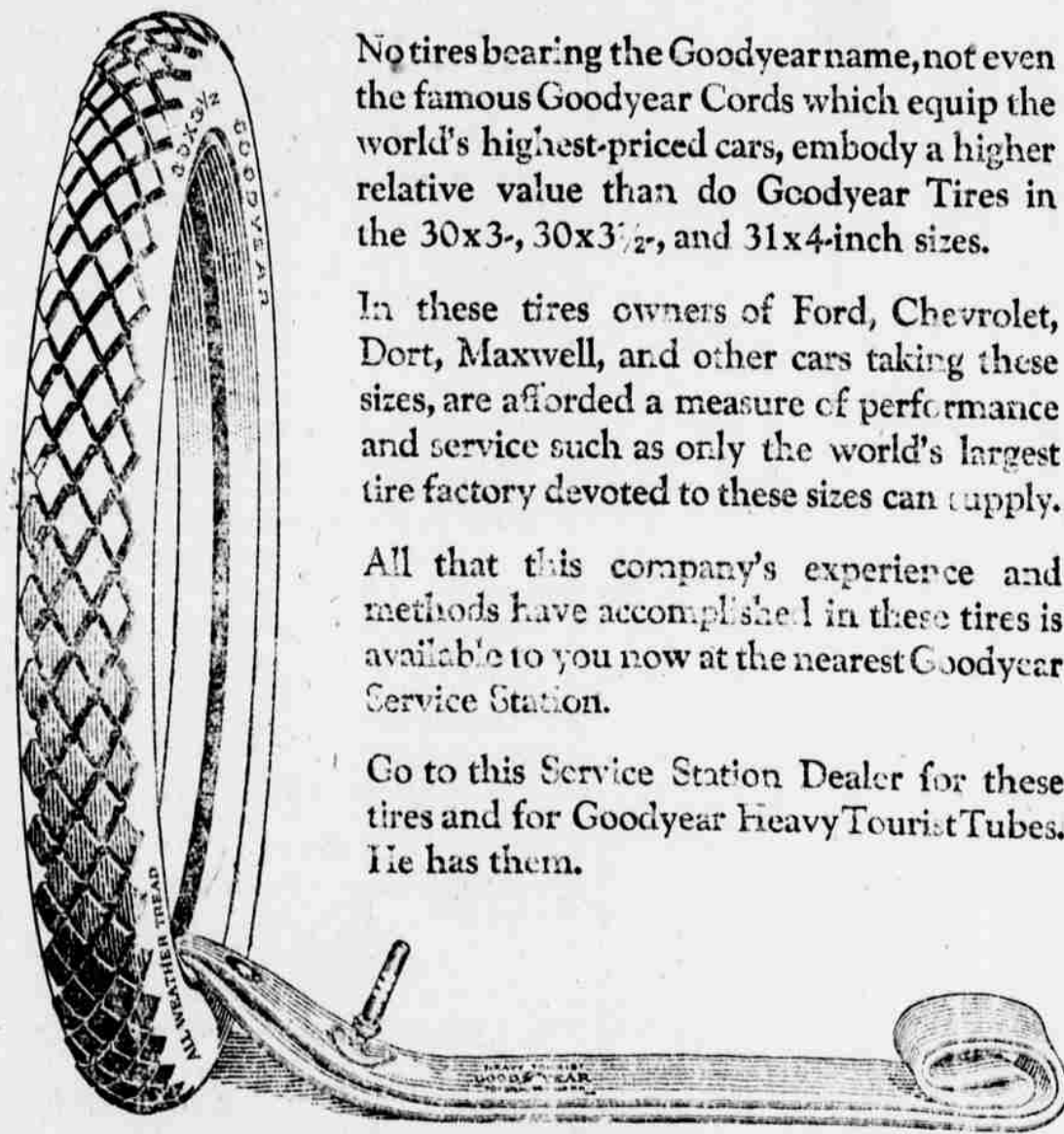
