75,000 Women to Yote in Morth Caroil-

There will be at least 75,000 women voters in North Carolina in the November election, in the
opinion of Attorney General J. $\mathbf{S}$. Manning, who believes the coun Man boards of elections should be gin immediately working on plans for the registration of this large number of women who wil cast their ballot for the firs time. The Attorney General be lieves the precincts should be di vided in the large communities, the cities and towns and suburban districts where the presen numbers of voters on the books now.
The county board of elections have the right to do this without any authority from the state bd. elecity for the mitter of pie cincts and their distribution left entirely in the hands of th county boards. An investigat ion of the situation that will prob ion or result from the increase in the number of voters by approx the number of voters by approx
imately' 50 per cent should b made in the near future and the made in the set up for the registration of the women. Judge Manning believes that no precinct should have more than 450 votes because of the handicap which the larger number prewhen they begin to count up.
The passage of the election m chinery bill, while not absolutely necessary, says the attorney gen eral, will save the judgesand reg istrars a great deal of trouble in that it makes clear the intention of the law regarding the regis tration of women. Judge Man ning does not think the women would have had to pay a capita tion tax under the present law for they would have been in the same position as the young voter just reaching his majority, who poll tax before the election. The women would not have had to pay the tax, but the Scales Bill makes tha prest on he law clea ntiones no room for interpre the necessity of sending out nu merous letters of instructions.
