The middle verse of the Bible is the 8th verse of the 118th Psalm.

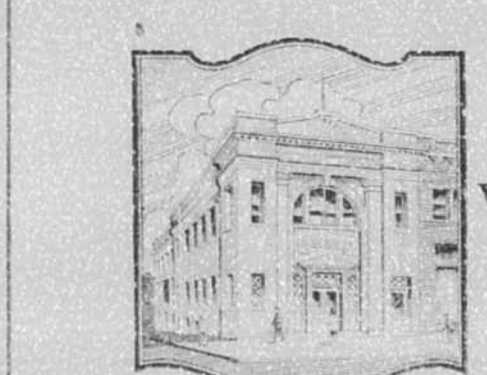
The 37th chapter of Isaiah and the 19th chapter of 11 Kings are alike in every word.
