ORPHAN ASSOCIATION IS GRATEFUL FOR PUBLICITY

To the Editor: At a recent meeting of the North Carolina Orphans Association a resolution was unanimously adopted expressing to the newspapers of the State the grateful appreciation of the organization for their liberality in presenting the needs of the fatherless ones to the public.

Another Thanksgiving season is approaching and the Association earnestly desires that it shall be a fruitful period for every child caring institution in the state. The Association expressed the wish that the usual campaign for voluntary contributions be conducted and designated the undersigned as members of the Publicity Committee.

The success of the movement must be measured largely by the cooperation shown by the newspapers of the state. The committee appreciates the fact that the editors of the papers are frequently imposed upon with propaganda for various and sundry objects, but feels that they will not object to again uniting in the effort to safeguard the interests of the orphaned children throughout the coming winter.

The Committee is asking for one day's income out of 365 from every citizen of the State on or near the Thanksgiving Day. Those who respond are asked to forward the amount directly to the orphanage of his or her choice; or this may be done through Church, Sunday School, community organization or fraternal order. The Publicity Committee handles no fund.

The publicity committee makes its first appeal to the newspapers, for it is through their columns it must reach the people, if they are to be reached at all. The call is urgent, and it is our hope that few if any will this year hear it in vain. Thousands of big hearted North Carolinians have been generously responding to the call. We believe they will do so again at the appointed time.

Please carry this message to your readers at the earliest convenience. By so doing you will render a service to society and aid a class of little folks who are unable to care for themselves.

Cricket Held in High Importance in China

In Shanghai the public parks, the gardens and the trees of the cathedral yard, in the center of the business district, are the favorite grounds of hundreds of Chinese coolies and boys. The quarry is the green cricket. To the Chinese a chirping cricket is a symbol of good luck. And crickets swarm on all the trees in the international settlement, and their noise rises above even that of the traffic. Boys climb the trees, pick off the crickets, put them into small basketlike cages and then go through the streets selling them for a copper or two each. One cricket or more are to be found in almost every native home, where they chirp and trill all day and all night. The noise of a cricket is to a Chinese the height of musical excellence plus the added virtue of good luck. If all the multifarious noises of the noisy city of Shanghai were boiled down into one, the song of the cricket would drown them. No opera singer could capture half the rapturous interest that the cricket is getting from the Chinese today.
