**THE VALUE OF A SILO**

The silo gives from 25 to 30 per cent more feeding value to the corn crop than when it is fed as dry fodder.

The silo provides the best and the cheapest form of succulent winter feed, which helps to keep the cows healthy and productive.

The silo is the cheapest farm building one can erect. It will house more nutrients per cubic foot of space than any other farm building.

It increases the livestock carrying capacity of the farm at least 25 per cent, and the producing capacity of the farm is increased at least 10 per cent.

The silo prevents the waste of the corn stalks which contain about 40 per cent of the feeding value of

the corn plant.

The silo enables the farmer to feed his stock from less acres thereby leaving more crops to be marketed and more profit to himself.

Good silage, properly fed, does not injure in the slightest the quality of the milk, butter or cheese.

It requires less labor to feed silage and the cattle waste very little of it.

The tall silo of small diameter is to be preferred to the one of less height and greater diameter.

The following is the amount of silage usually fed to different kinds of livestock:

Dairy cattle from 30 to 40 pounds per day.

Beef cattle from 30 to 40 pounds per day.

Horses 20 pounds per day.

Dairy cattle supplementary rytao  
Dairy cattle supplementary to pasture 15 pounds per day.

Sheep 2 pounds per day.

A silo 10 feet in diameter and 25 feet high will hold approximately 36 tons and will feed ten head of dairy cows for 180 days.

A silo 12 feet in diameter and 32 feet high will hold about 72 tons and will feed twenty head of dairy cattle for 180 days.

A silo 17 feet in diameter and 37 feet high will hold about 180 tons and will feed fifty head of dairy cattle for 180 days.

If you are in the livestock business talk to your neighbor who has been feeding silage.
