STATE SURVEY

Mrs. Nina D. Glenn, widow of former Governor Robert B. Glenn, died at her home in Winston-Salem this Thursday after an illness of several weeks.

North Carolina paid the largest per capita tax to the federal government of any state in the union during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1926, the annual report of the federal general revenue says. North Carolina's tax averaged \$7.32 per person in the state.

Gold production in North Carolina is reported to have jumped from a total value of \$1,740 in 1924 to \$1,740 in 1925. This represents nearly half the output of the eastern states. Gold Hill and Kure have been in the lead in gold production. The U. S. Geological Survey has other deposits in McDowell and Rowan counties in small amounts.

The greatest outbreak of automobile robbery in North Carolina since the outbreak was reported in November by Edwin Harris, head of the automobile theft bureau of the state department of revenue. A total of 179 cars were stolen during the month and only 77 were recovered. There were more numerous in the western part of the state, it is declared, which is attributed to the easy sale of stolen cars across the line in Tennessee where there is no title registration law.

Larrison, of Moorehead, author of the state prohibition law, was named chairman of the committee. Mrs. Julia Alexander, of Charlotte, is secretary to the committee.
