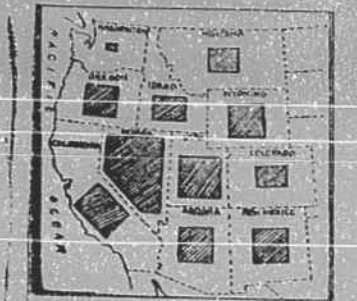


Uncle Sam's Real Estate

HOT ROLLS

Where is the person who doesn't like hot rolls? And yet knowing this to be a fact, many women never attempt making hot rolls for their families, thinking it is a difficult process. Making hot rolls is easy. Once a housewife starts making them, she will always make them. Her friends will demand them when they come a-dining, and almost over night she has a reputation for making rolls that fairly "melt in your mouth."

The recipe I am going to give you requires little kneading and handling, and only a short time of mixing until ready for the oven. The secret of this

quickness lies in the fact that we use soft wheat and plenty of yeast. We call them Parker House rolls, and you make them as follows:

- 2 cups scalded milk 6 to 7 cups soft 2 tsp. sugar wheat flour 2 compressed yeast 1 1/2 tsp. salt 2 cakes 2 tbsp. fat

Scald the milk, add the sugar, and let cool until it is lukewarm; add the yeast and stir until it is dissolved. Then beat in enough flour to make a soft batter. Add the salt and fat and stir in enough flour to make a smooth dough. Place the dough in a greased bowl, cover with a cloth, and let stand until the dough is double in bulk; cut with a large biscuit cutter, grease the biscuit with melted butter, grease through center with knife, and fold one-half over the other; grease the top of each roll and place on a well greased baking sheet to bake. When the rolls double in bulk, bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.). These delicious rolls require only about 1 1/2 hours.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS OF THE TOWN OF BOONE, NORTH CAROLINA.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Boone, North Carolina, held in the town offices of said town at 7:30 p. m. on December 31, 1929, at which the following members were present: R. S. Swift, Mayor; H. B. Perry, L. L. Bingham, and J. D. Rankin, Aldermen, and the following absent: None.

Dr. H. B. Perry introduced the following ordinance and L. L. Bingham moved its adoption:

"An ordinance authorizing the issuance of street improvement bonds of the Town of Boone, North Carolina."

BE IT OBTAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Boone, North Carolina, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, bonds of the Town of Boone, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued for the purpose of constructing, reconstructing, and paving of certain streets in said town.

Section 2. The maximum aggregate principal amount of bonds to be issued hereunder is \$25,000.

Section 3. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 4. A statement of the debt of the town has been filed with the Town Clerk, and is open to public inspection.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication, unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the town is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, in which event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the town at an election as provided in the said Act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the thirty-first day of December, 1929, and first published on the second day of January, 1930. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days of its first publication.

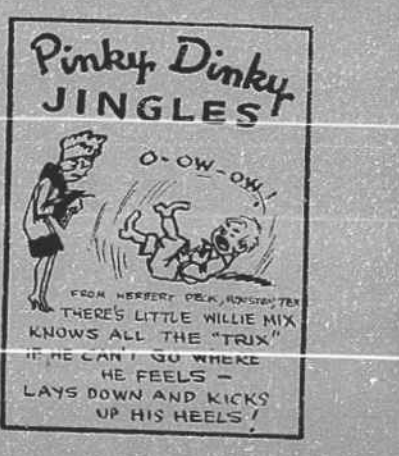
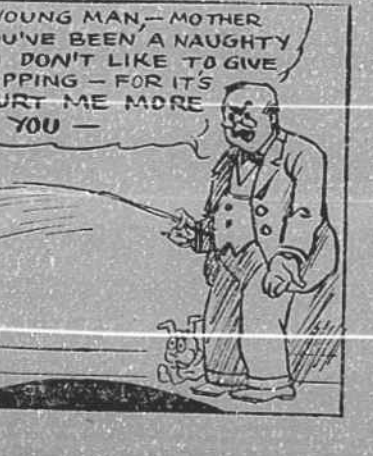
