SPECIAL TERM OF COURT ORDERED

Governor Sets Aside Period Beginning December 3rd for Civil Term in Watauga. Judge Clayton Moore to Preside. Sixty-odd Cases.

Governor Ehringhaus last Saturday called a special term of court for Watauga County, for trial of civil cases, beginning December 3rd and continuing for two weeks.

The gubernatorial action came as a result of the petition of all members of the Watauga bar, who are anxious that the civil calendar be cleared. More than sixty cases yet remain on the docket, and Clerk South believes it is possible to get rid of the congestion during the two weeks.

3,597 WATAUGANS ON RELIEF DURING MONTH OF AUGUST

Watauga had 3,597 persons, or 23.7 per cent of the county's population on relief in August, according to reports from the office of Mrs. Thomas O'Berry, State director, Monday.

These include 661 families, totaling 3,376 persons, and 21 single residents, a total of 682 cases, or families and individuals. The case load in this county increased 1.6 per cent in August over the case load in July, the director's report shows.

North Carolina had 11.2 per cent of the State population, or 355,228 persons, on Federal relief rolls during August, says Mrs. O'Berry. The State had 72,187 families totaling 346,759 persons—4.8 persons to the family—on relief rolls, along with 8,483 single residence persons, or a total of 80,656 cases; that is, families and individuals. This is an increase of 7 per cent in case load over July. All but thirteen of the one hundred counties showed an increase in case load, the report continued.

Harnett had the smallest percentage of its population on relief, 3.3 per cent. Cleveland had only 3.9 per cent and Beaufort only 4.3 per cent. Avery had 32.5 per cent, nearly one-third of its population, on relief. Brunswick had 31 per cent. Currituck 29.2 per cent, Graham 27.9 per cent, Clay 26.9 per cent.

NEW ENROLLMENT RECORD AT A.S.T.C.

912 Students Now Taking Training at Appalachian, an Increase of More Than Fifty Over Last Year. Credit Increase to Better Times.

Nine hundred and twelve students had been enrolled at the Appalachian State Teachers' College Monday, breaking an all-time record for the regular fall term. The present aggregation of students is more than fifty ahead of the same period last year, it is said.

Included in the recent registrations are 300 men, a notable increase in the percentage of male students. This fact, college officials believe, is a result of generally improved financial conditions over the country. No changes have been made in the faculty personnel for the fall term.
