

PLANT NOW FOR SUMMER GARDENS

Extension Horticulturist Suggests Succession Plantings for Home Needs.

A continuous supply of fresh vegetables may be obtained from the garden by arranging the crops so that new plantings will mature as the earlier crops are harvested.

The entire garden may be kept busy by planting again in the areas left vacant by the harvesting of early crops. Sometimes an early crop can be followed by a later planting of the same vegetable.

H. R. Niswonger, extension horticulturist at State College, suggests that succession plantings of beets, garden peas, carrots, celery and cauliflower may be made in the latter part of April or in May, depending upon the location.

Spending a portion of the western part of the State, he said that sweet corn should be planted as soon as the ground is warm enough. Tomato, pepper and cabbage may be moved from the plant boxes to cold frames in May to harden them before setting them out in the open garden.

Other May plantings suggested are: snap beans, lima beans, beets, sweet corn, carrots, cucumbers, cantaloupes, okra, parsley, peas, endive, pepper, radish, squash and squash. Sow tomato seed again for late planting.

At this time, tomato seed may be sown in the open, about 25 seeds to each foot of row. After the plants come up, set them out two to four inches apart to develop strong roots before they are placed in the garden. A covering of pine straw or similar litter will hold moisture and check the growth of weeds.

Companion cropping may be practiced by setting cabbage or lettuce between rows of onions. Peas and tomatoes, lettuce and newly set strawberry plants, or onions and cantaloupes are other combinations which may be grown together.

ORCHARD QUESTION

When should trees be sprayed to control apple blight?

Answer: For best results the sprays should be begun as soon as the blossoms are open. For those varieties that bloom at one time only one application need be made and this should be applied when one-half to three-fourths of the blossoms are open. The irregular blooming varieties, such as the Yellow Transparent and Golden Delicious will require more than one application.

Doughton Will Not Seek The Governorship in '36

position as chairman of the powerful Ways and Means Committee and make the race for Governor of his native State.

Pressure Brought
This publication caused a great deal of pressure to be brought to bear on Mr. Doughton, with Speaker Joseph W. Byrns and Secretary of State Cordell Hull leading the movement to keep Mr. Doughton in his present powerful post. It is no secret that Secretary Hull's views on the tariff are quite different from those of the ranking majority member of the committee, Representative Samuel Hill of Washington, who is rated as a protectionist Democrat and who would have succeeded Mr. Doughton as chairman. On the other hand, Chairman Doughton has worked in the closest harmony with Secretary Hull on reciprocal tariff and other questions.

Secretary Hull is believed to have been at least partly responsible for the latest White House pressure, although President Roosevelt had evinced interest in the matter before, and Monday's conversation was the second he had had with the Congressman.

Not to Remain Long in Congress

Mr. Doughton yesterday reiterated his intention of not "remaining long" in Congress, but made it clear that he has no present expectation of retiring at the end of the present term.

"So far as I know now, I shall be a candidate to succeed myself next year," he said.

Mr. Doughton's action reopens speculation as to who will run for Governor. There is no question about Lieutenant Governor A. H. Graham, who is already counted in the field. It has been whispered around Washington that if Mr. Doughton entered the race, former Congressman Clyde R. Hoey would not run. Now it is generally expected here that Mr. Hoey will become a candidate.

His Statement

Mr. Doughton's statement of Monday follows in full:

"After mature consideration on my part, and consultation with the highest Administration leaders, I have decided not to become a candidate for Governor of North Carolina. My position as chairman of the Ways and Means Committee makes it necessary for me to consider other duties rather than my own inclinations.

"I have reached this decision reluctantly. For the past several months so many people in North Carolina have urged me to become a candidate for Governor that their insistence had become a pressure which seemed impossible to decline. I hardly need to say, however, that my decision not to make the race is no evidence of a lack of interest in the welfare of my State. I have merely been convinced that my best field of service at the present time, if I am to remain in public life, is with the Congress and for the nation.

"There is no way for me to adequately express the deep appreciation I feel to those thousands of friends and fellow citizens of North Carolina who have evidenced their confidence in me by wanting me as their Governor. I am profoundly grateful for their generous expressions and deeply conscious of the trust they would place in me."

COURT RECEIVES REPORT OF JURY

Public Buildings, Records, Etc. Are in Good Condition. Minor Repairs Ordered.

The Grand Jury for the Spring term of Superior Court in its usual report finds conditions as to county property and records good, but recommends some repairs to buildings. The text of the report, which is signed by J. B. Horton as foreman, is as follows:

"We the Grand Jury for the Spring term of Court for Watauga County, North Carolina, desire to make the following report:

"To His Honor Judge Don Phillips: We have carefully and patiently looked into and passed on all presentments made to us.

"We in a body visited and looked over the offices and public buildings as follows: First, Registers office, and found it in excellent condition, clean, neat, and in good order; Second, the Clerks' office, and found it in good order in every respect; Third, County Jail, good order and the prisoners satisfied with their treatment; Fourth, County Home, we found nine inmates who made no complaints and seemed well satisfied; the building appeared to be well kept and clean. However, the building needs some repairs, water leaks in at every fire and causes the plaster to fall off the walls. We recommend that these leaks be stopped. The sewage line needs some repairs, also the plumbing in kitchen needs some repairs.

"We recommend that the County Home be electrically lighted.

"Fifth, we visited the State Prison camp and found it in perfect order, clean, sanitary and prisoners well satisfied with their fare and treatment. Captain Brown seems to be the right man in the right place.
