THREE PER CENT TAX ON MEALS

Cafes, Tourist Camps and Cafes Subject to State Levy. Collector Holmes Explains.

A three per cent tax on all meals served by cafes, tourist camps and hotels will be imposed, beginning June 1st, according to G. H. Holmes Jr., deputy Commissioner of Internal Revenue, who was a visitor in Boone Tuesy by The first payment of this tax will be due July 10, 1935, and the tax is to be paid monthly by the tenth of each month thereafter. This tax, Mr. Holmes explained, applies to all boarding houses soliciting or advertising for transient patronage.

Outlining changes in the sales tax law Mr. Holmes listed the following items as exempt from the 1935 levy;

(a) gasoline; (b) commercial fertilizer on which the inspection tax is paid; (c) public school books on the adopted list; (d) sales to State of North Carolina or any of its subdi-visions, including sales to agencies of State or local governments for distribution in public welfare or relief Paty of Palm Beach Plaza, Palm Reach Plaza, Palm sold by producer or purchased for re b) sales of products of farms, forests, waters and mines, when such sales are made by producers, manufacturers or fishermen. The exemp-tion in article "f" does not extend to producers, manufacturers or fishermen who become merchants or who maintain a store or stores to sell or dispose of their products.

Monthly Reports

"The new sales tax law requires that all sales tax reports be made monthly," continued Mr. Holmes, "on or before the 15th day of the month next succeeding the month in which the tax accrues. But through the Federal Housing Administration money is available through the co-operation of financial institutions, building supply dealers and Crop Production Credit Associagram. Such loans are called government usured loans because the United States government insures the financial institutions or any approved lend-ing agency 20 per cent against loss of the aggregate amount of loans made during the five-year period. The highest loss ever sustained by financial institutions making similar loans has been 3 per cent. The margin of guarantee made by the United States Government, therefore, makes this a 100 per cent guarantee against loss.

Among the many things that can be done with modernization credit money includes installing a water tem of pump and motor, roofing, painting installing heating plants, adding bath rooms or making sanitary improvements, screening porch es, adding another room or two, build-ing tourist cabins, litter feeds, hay tracks, silos, incubators, storage vats windows, doors, garages, etc.

Blowing Rock to Get Cheaper Power Rates

RALEIGH, N. C. Reduction in lectric rates of about 32 per cent for small users in Northwestern North Carolina summer resorts, Roaring Gap in Surry County and Blowing Rock in Watauga County, has been made by the Northwest Carolina Utilties, operating in that section, Utilities Commissioner Stanley Winborn announces.

The reduction for combined residence (cooking) rates is from 15 to 10 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 30 kwh, 5 cents for the next 70, 3 cents for the next 200 and all over 200 will be at the rate of 2 cents.

333 In the general commercial rate the 3000 reduction is to 10 cents for the first 100 kwh, 8 cents for the next 100 kwh, 5 cents for the next 150 kwh, and 3 cents for all over 350 kwh,


