BUSY YEAR FOR RAIDERS

RALEIGH, N. C.—Federal revenue agents in the North Carolina district during the fiscal year, ending June 30, destroyed 1905 distilleries, made 753 arrests and confiscated 123 automobiles, according to T. E. Patton, in charge. He further said that 27,849 gallons of whiskey and 1,493,519 gallons of mash were poured out. Fines were imposed totaling \$45,116 and 116,731 days of imprisonment were imposed.

POU SAYS THAT STATE IS ADAPTED TO ALFALFA

The risk has been removed from the growing of alfalfa in North Carolina and the crop may now be considered as a valuable adjunct to successful farming, especially through the Piedmont section, believes R. W. Pou, county agent of Forsyth County and veteran alfalfa grower.

"Most Piedmont soils, if properly prepared, will grow alfalfa profitably," says Mr. Pou. "The heavy, clay soils will maintain a stand of the crop longer than will the sandy, lighter soils. It is preferable that land intended for alfalfa should have some previous treatment. This usually can be given without the loss of a single crop. Land that has previously grown corn or cotton is better to begin with because the cultivation given these crops destroys weed and grass seed which are the worst enemies to successful alfalfa growing."

Pow the selected field deeply in November or December, or as soon as soil conditions will permit, again plow the soil eight to ten inches deep and cultivate it after every rain, so that the moisture supply will be conserved. Plant the alfalfa in August or September using from 20 to 25 pounds of adapted seed.

The soil must be limed during the course of preparation using from three to five tons to the acre preferably applied in two applications during the winter and summer following the breaking of the land and before the subsequent harrowing. Apply about 400 pounds of a 2-12-4 fertilizer a few days previous to seeding. This fertilizer may be put in with a wheat drill.

Mr. Pou says the alfalfa seed should be inoculated either with soil from some field where the crop has been grown or with commercial inoculation.

CUT FLOWERS MAY BE KEPT FRESH AND PRETTY

Cut flowers can be kept for a considerable time when given the proper care, says Glenn O. Randall, associate professor of horticulture at State College.

Cut the flowers with a sharp knife early in the morning or late in the afternoon, he advises. Then immerse the stems full length in cool water and place them in a cool place for an hour or more.

Keep flowers only in clean containers. Change the water at least once a day, more often in extremely hot weather.

When changing the water, cut off about an inch of the stems so as to provide a fresh surface through which the water may pass. Hold the stems under water while cutting off the end, as this keeps air from getting into the conducting tissue and blocking the flow of the water.

Remove the soft lower leaves from the stems, as they have a tendency to decay quickly. Keep the flowers in a cool place at night to preserve them longer.

Don't put aspirin, salt, quinine, potassium permanganate, or other chemicals in the water, for they do not help the flowers, contrary to popular belief, Randall points out.

However, an experiment at Cornell University has shown that keeping flowers in a copper vessel helps prolong their life. A small quantity of copper dissolves in the water and hinders the growth of the bacteria which cause decay.

Do not handle the flowers roughly, as anything that tends to break or bruise the plants causes them to wither sooner, Randall adds.

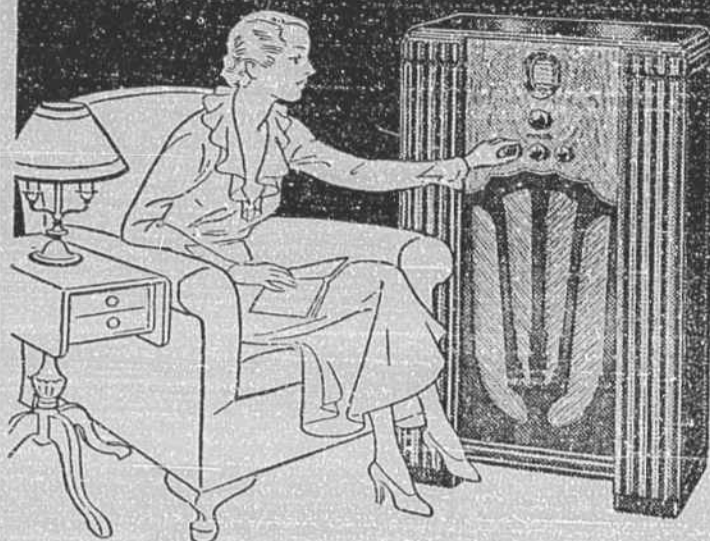
