

WPA Cannot Absorb Relief Clients Now

Check Shows Only 7,000 to 8,000 Placed On Projects In State To Date.

Raleigh, Nov. 4.—Absorption of emergency relief clients by the state works progress administration, or works projects probably will not be completed before December 1, it appeared today.

Today was the date originally set for ending direct relief, but today a check showed only 7,000 to 8,000 persons employed on WPA projects and fewer than that by other government agencies in North Carolina.

Before the direct relief program can be ended, jobs must be given by the WPA or other agencies to approximately 50,000 persons in North Carolina, Harry L. Hopkins, federal

works progress and emergency relief administrator, recently indicated direct relief grants would be stopped in November—before December 1.

For the first 15 days of November, a grant of \$350,000 has been made to the North Carolina emergency relief administration, as compared with a total of \$500,000 for the entire month of October, \$500,000 for August.

Mrs. Thomas O'Berry, state relief administrator, had requested for the whole of November a grant of \$1,140,000 on the basis of an anticipated relief roll of 51,000 for the month. Relief rolls are showing the customary seasonal gains in numbers, despite provision of jobs by the WPA.

The engineering office of the state WPA announced today that projects which would give jobs to 24,727 persons within ten days had been approved and forwarded to district directors with instructions to begin

work at once. The state WPA is selecting and allocating funds for projects at the rate of 50 or 29 projects per day.

The WPA has set a goal of putting 20,000 to work by Armistice day and 34,500 by Thanksgiving.

Tongue Tells Condition

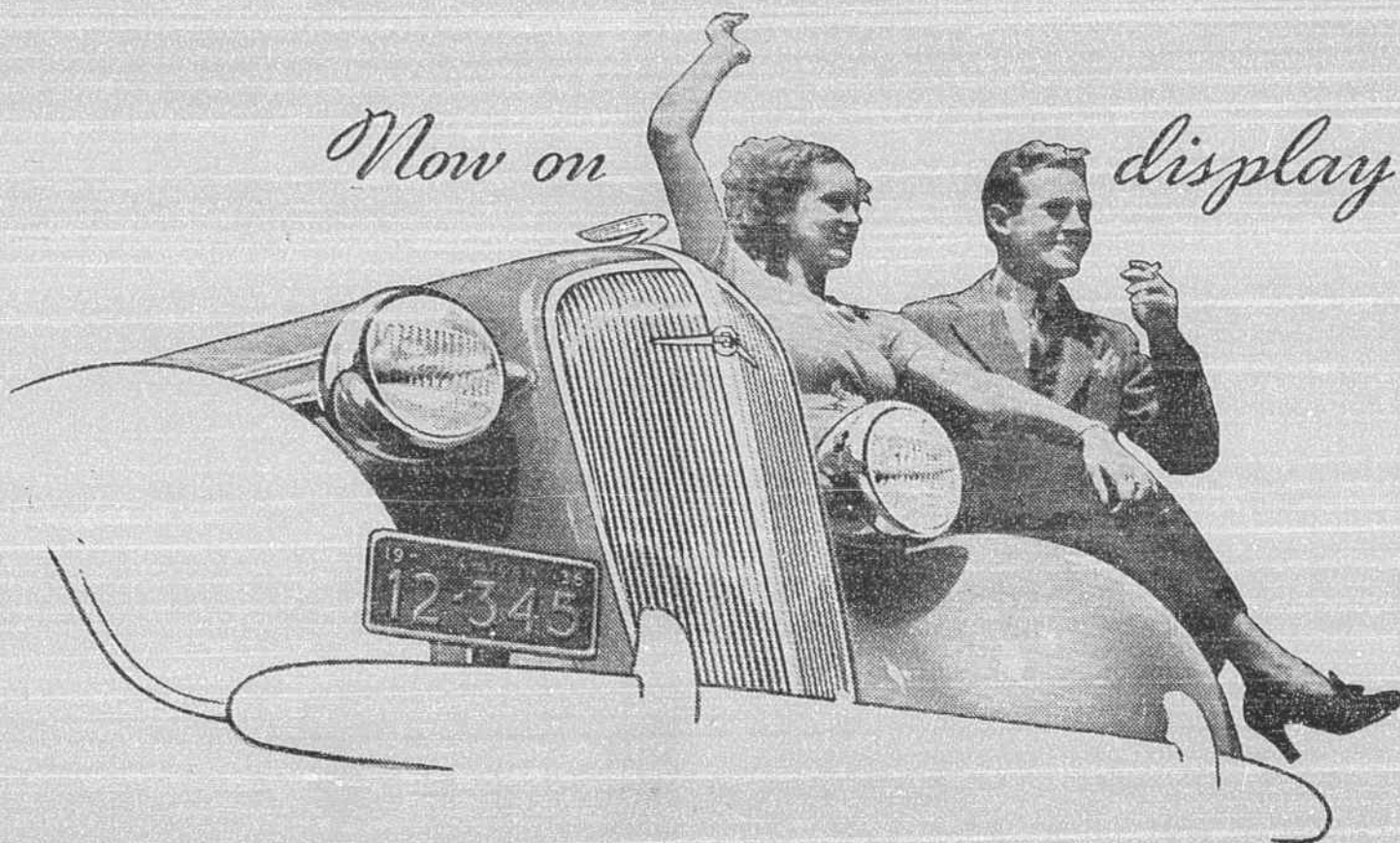

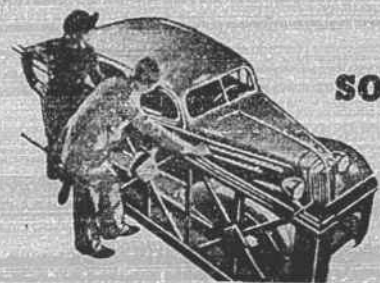

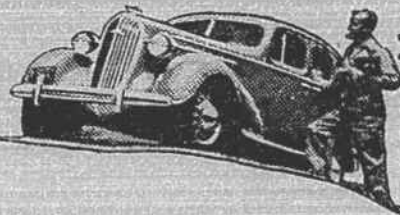
