Columbia, N. C., lawyers, have been named by a select committee authorized by Congress to make investigations of such activities and report back when Congress reconvenes. Trivial complaints will not be considered, but those apparently of merit will be gone into by these attorneys. They invite those with complaints to present them. Many such reorganizations have been made vicious rackets and thousands of bondholders and other creditors victimized. Too large parts of assets have often been dissipated in paying large management and legal fees, it is pointed out.

REVOKE DRIVER'S LICENSE

The first driver's license revoked under the new Drivers' License Act has been received by the Division of Highway Safety. It was issued to Boyd Coats, East Laurinburg, who was sentenced for drunken driving. The sentence automatically revokes the license for a period of one year. The license was revoked as of November 4, four days after the new law became effective. Licenses are being mailed out rapidly, but it is expected to be 10 or 15 days before all can be mailed to the approximately 800,000 applicants. The law is not being rigidly enforced until the licenses have been mailed out.

NOTHING TO OFFER

Miss Susie M. Sharpe, prominent and able young woman attorney of Reidsville, was embarrassed last week in a workmen's compensation case scheduled for hearing before Industrial Commissioner T. A. Wilson when she asked and was granted a continuance of the hearing. She explained that the injured worker was away at a CCC camp and she had not been able to get in touch with him, one witness had been committed to an insane asylum, another had left the state and the third was then being tried in criminal court. She had nobody and nothing to offer.

EDUCATION WEEK PROGRAMS

Seven different people are making seven talks each over the seven different radio broadcasting stations in North Carolina this week on phases of education in celebration of "American Education Week," the general theme being "School and Democracy." The broadcasts are under auspices of the N. C. Education Association, Parent-Teacher Congress, American Legion and State Department of Public Instruction. The topics deal with schools and the citizen, the state, the nation, social change, country life, recreation and religion. The stations are located at Asheville, Charlotte, Durham, Greensboro, Raleigh, Rocky Mount and Winston-Salem.

PUBLIC ACCIDENTS LEAD

Accidents to employees of the state counties and cities were 20 times more severe last year, fiscal than industrial accidents, the N. C. Industrial Commission shows in a study made of such accidents which were compensable and reported to the commission. The total cost of all accidental injuries in the state for 1934-35 was \$1,107,209, of which \$115,685, or 10 per cent, was on accidents of governmental employees, yet only

one-half of one per cent. of the total number of cases reported were of accidents to governmental employees. Commissioner T. A. Wilson, in charge of safety work, is calling this to the attention of state, county and city officials and urging them to teach safety methods to employees.

FEDERAL FUNDS SPENT

North Carolina was appropriated \$11,363,234 under the National Industrial Recovery Act for highway work for both 1934 and 1935, of which all had been spent or provision made for using it, except \$409,606, up to October 1. All of the cost, except probably 10 per cent, was furnished by the Federal government. From this and the small state addition, 1,172.6 miles of highways have been completed at a cost of \$12,293,127; 169.9 miles are under construction, estimated cost \$2,388,911, and 162 miles had been approved for construction, estimated cost \$401,127. All of the fund, except a few odds and ends, has been accounted for by this time, and the state is well along on spending the later funds, which have to be matched 50-50.

MAKE 96 SURVEYS

Rural electrification surveys have been made in 96 of the 100 counties, which cover 964 different lines of 5,370 miles and to serve 31,913 customers. Chairman Dudley Bagley reports. The original survey last year included 78 counties, 677 lines, 4,488 miles and to serve 22,799 customers. The surveys recently completed were in 65 counties, new lines in several surveyed last year, on 287 new lines

of 1,383 miles and to serve 9,134 customers. No requests for surveys had come from the four counties in which no surveys have yet been made.

\$30,000 TO GO TO WORK

The WPA office here had approved projects which will put more than 30,000 to work when they get under way in the next few days, in approvals through last week. The offices worked through Armistice Day in order to get projects for as many people as possible, seeking to get all employables to work in a month.

STRANGE BEDFELLOWS

A study in contrasts: Dr. Ralph W. McDonald, candidate for Governor, called on Governor Ehringhaus last week. News men in the outer office listened to raised voices and had occasional peeps at the two, both forward and erect in their chairs, both gesticulating and gesturing and talking at the same time. . . . And the contrast: The next day Clyde R. Hoey, candidate for Governor, called on Governor Ehringhaus. A lone reporter observed through the open door that both men were sitting back leisurely in their chairs, composed and quiet, so quiet that not a word of their conversation, nor even their voices, got past the open door. Dr. McDonald let it be known he was trying to get the Governor to do something about sick leave for teachers, for political, as well as for humanitarian purposes, probably. Mr. Hoey, attending Supreme Court, said he just paid a friendly call on the Governor.
