AAA TOPIC OF MEET COLLEGIATE FORUM

Series of Forum Lectures And Discussions Arranged At Lees-McRae College.

Banner Elk, Feb. 13.—A series of forum discussions and lectures on topics of current interest was opened tonight at Lees-McRae college with a discussion of the Supreme Court's decision on the AAA. Fate Beal, a member of the senior class of Lees-McRae college presided at the program which was made up of the following talks on the question by members of the government class of the college: Attitude of Lee Western Farmers in Regard to the AAA, by Arthur Pharr; Attitude of the Southern Farmers in Regard to the AAA, by Connie Baucom; The Supreme Court decision in Regard to the AAA, by Ruth Hopper; Public Opinion in Regard to the Supreme Court's Decision by Vernon Crawley. These talks were followed by open forum conducted by Miss Sarah Turlington, head of the history department. The establishment of this forum has been made possible by friends of Mary Mildred Sullivan, who during her life time was always a promoter of education in the mountain sections of the South. Since her death her son, George H. Sullivan of New York, and her friends have continued to aid many of the educational institutions in which she was interested. Mrs. Sullivan's memory is cherished at Lees-McRae college through the Sullivan Society which upholds and honors her as an example of very fine womanhood. The active interest of her son and friends in education is indicated by the Mary Mildred Sullivan scholarships established at Lees-McRae in her memory and by the gifts of books in the library. The forum, which is a further evidence of their interest, will be held twice a month. The first meeting of each

month will be conducted by the government class and will be open to only the students and college community. The second meeting of the month will be in the form of a public lecture followed by an opened discussion. 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Need Three Millions To Repair Highways

Raleigh, Feb. 16.—Charles Ross, general counsel for the highway and public works commission, observed today that even if the weather damage to the highway system this winter is \$3,000,000 it represents only 1 per cent of North Carolina's investment in highways.

"We have had probably the most destructive weather conditions from a road point of view that we have had in 30 years," Ross said, "but it seems to me no occasion for alarm."

"Our maintenance budget is on the basis of ordinary or average weather conditions," he continued. "This is an abnormal condition and the abnormal damage is not peculiar to the highways. The damage to all classes of exposed properties is perhaps as relatively great as highway damage."

"If the highway system, representing an investment of more than \$300,000,000, completely exposed to the elements and bearing up a traffic more destructive by reason of its weakened condition, can be restored to anything like normal for 1 per cent of its cost I think we are lucky."

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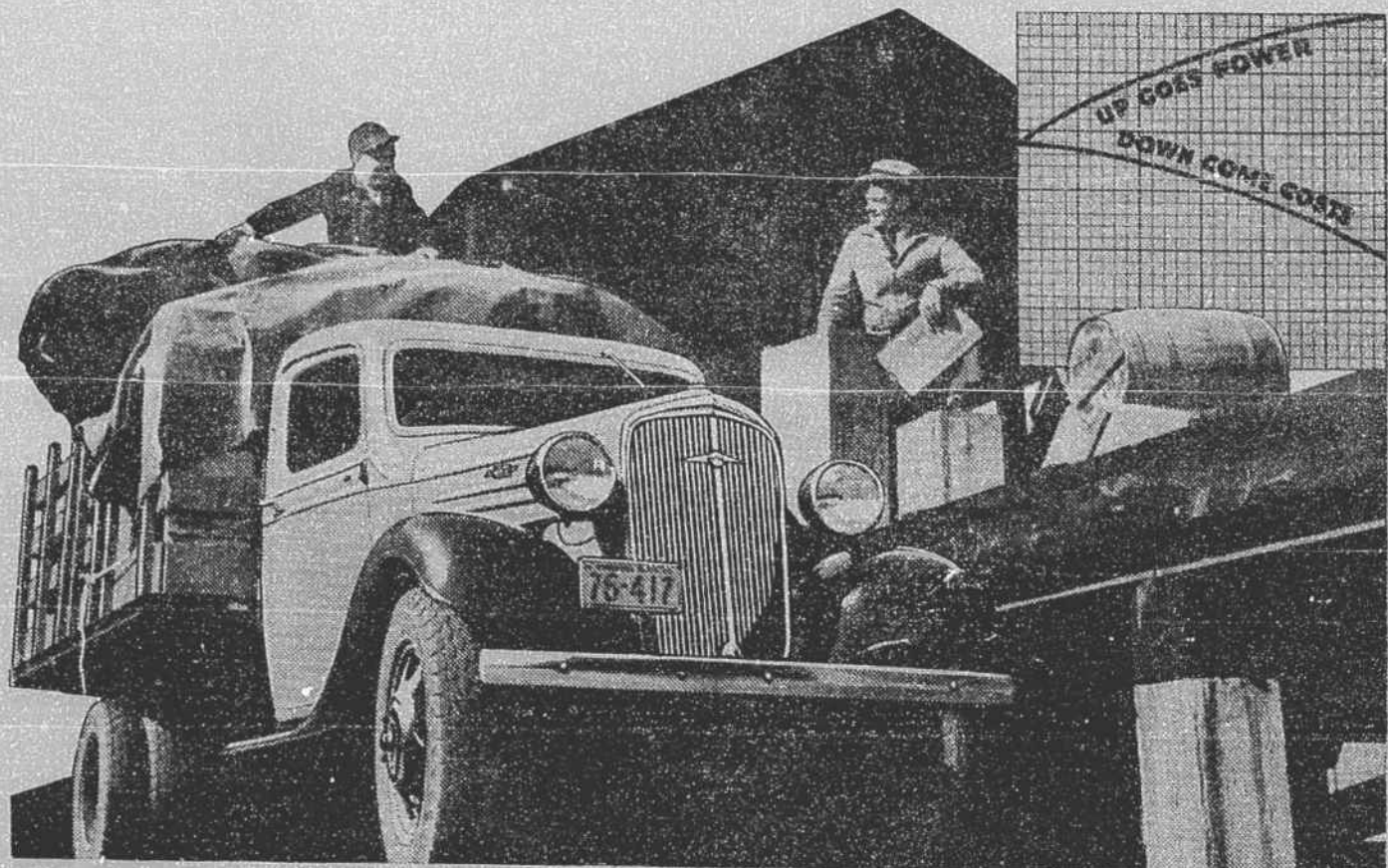
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
