

Appalachian Actualities

The Appalachian victory bell rang for two reasons last Saturday, October 16, the first of which was to ring out the Mountaineers' victory over Western Carolina State Teachers College, the score being 20-2, and the second reason was because Coach W. W. Watkins of the Appalachian staff was married to Miss Martha Delaney, student here and former citizen of Charlotte. The football victory puts the Appalachian team in the nation's lead with a total of 191 points for four games, and the marriage places Coach Watkins on equal basis with Coach Stewart, who married just recently.

Reports from the Associated Press sports writers tend to show that the highest scoring team in the nation is Dartmouth's Indians with 145 points for the season, but this statement cannot be verified since Appalachian has scored 191 points, thus putting the Mountaineers in the lead by 43 points. The sports writers credit the highest scoring man of the nation with 40 points, but Len Wilson, Boone citizen, has shattered this competitive point record by crashing across the goal line for his 63rd point this season. He has scored 23 points more than any other man in the nation.

Appalachian is one of the ten undefeated teams in the East. At present the Mountaineers and Catawba are tied for first place in the North State Conference. The deciding battle will occur November 7, at which time Appalachian will play the Catawba Indians at Salisbury. The game will decide the conference championship.

Next Saturday the mountaineers will face their toughest opponents for the season when they meet the South Georgia Teachers. These Georgians have proved their ability this year by defeating Erskine 26-0. The Erskine team beat Lenoir-Rhyne 12-0, and Appalachian, after a tough battle was victorious over Lenoir-Rhyne, 14-0. Thus it is evident that the Georgians are better than the Mountaineers by 24 points, but only the game next Saturday will decide.

Along with the sports of the college, Appalachian is active in other fields. Last Monday evening a private piano recital was presented at the college by the students of Mrs. A. M. Norton of Boone.

Mr. Waters from Lexington, is at the college this week taking pictures for next year's yearbook, the Rhododendron.
