At present both teams are claiming the championship title in the Smoky Mountain Conference. Carson-Newman was put back in the race by the recent ruling of Commissioner W. O. Lowe to the effect that East Tennessee Teachers College forfeited their game with the Eagles because they played an ineligible man.

HAYES SENTENCES 35 TO FEDERAL PRISONS

Govan Lane Succumb At Home Near Boone

Rufus Govan Lane, 71 years old, and a well known citizen of the Howards Creek neighborhood, died at his home Saturday.

Funeral services were conducted from the home by the pastor, Rev. E. C. Hodges, who was assisted in the rites by Rev. W. D. Ashley, and interment was in the Lent Brown cemetery.

Following is a memorial sketch in connection with Mr. Lane's death, which was written for the paper:

Rufus Govan Lane was born October 19, 1865, and died November 28, 1936, age 71 years, 1 month and 18 days. He was married to Margaret Hodges in December, 1889. To this union were born 10 children, two having died in infancy. Four boys and four girls are living: Mrs. J. W. Cuddy, Princeton, W. Va.; R. F. Lane, Idlewild; Bruce Lane, Fresno, Ohio; Mrs. Luther Hardy, Mrs. Joe Barnes, Larry, Ernest and Lina, all of Boone. There are 27 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Mr. Lane professed religion many years ago, but never united with any church. A good father and a useful citizen and a kind neighbor has gone from our midst. We wish to ask the children or any of the grand children that are not prepared, to get ready to meet father and grandfather over on that peaceful shore where no sorrow nor death can enter.

Anny Lutz Lectures On the Passion Play

Banner Elk, Nov. 30. The Lees-McRae College forum for this year opened Saturday night with the presentation of Anny Lutz, who has the distinction of having twice played the part of the Virgin Mary in the noted Passion Play of Oberammergau, Bavaria. A capacity crowd of students, faculty and residents of Banner Elk and surrounding communities pronounced Miss Lutz's description of the famous religious drama and the customs of Oberammergau one of the finest entertainments ever presented in the college auditorium.

Appearing in a beautiful Bavarian costume, Miss Lutz thrilled the spectators with her vivid interpretation of the origin, history and characterizations of the Passion Play. Although her rich speaking voice has decided German accent, it was easily understood.

The Passion Play, said Miss Lutz, is given in Oberammergau as the fulfilling of a vow taken by the people of the village during an epidemic of the plague in 1633 that they would present it every ten years if the dread disease were stopped. There were no more deaths from that time on, and the play is repeated every ten years today with the same plan and story. Players are chosen for their likeness to the Biblical characters whose parts they play, and are elected by a committee of villagers. Only natives of Oberammergau may appear in the play. More than 1,400 persons are in the drama, which is presented on an outdoor stage before a hall seating 6,000 people. The play lasts 7 1/2 hours, and is presented two or three times each week during the summer months. Rehearsing begins five months before the play is given.

Following her lecture the speaker explained a series of lantern slides of Germany, the Bavarian Alps and Oberammergau and its famous Passion Play. Pictures of principal characters in the play are also shown, including those of Miss Lutz herself in the role of Mary. She then answered a number of questions from the audience. A social hour ended the evening's entertainment.

TO GIVE BROADCASTS ON WINTER PROBLEMS

Prospects of a prolonged cold winter remind farmers that many new tasks will be added to their day's work.

Specialists of the extension service, the school of agriculture, and the experiment station at State College will attempt through radio talks on the Carolina Farm Features program to lighten the farmer's burden by giving latest available information on farm problems.

For instance, dairy cattle need extra care during the winter if they are to stay in the best condition and produce the largest amounts of milk. Good shelters will be needed as well as plenty of water from which the chill has been taken.

Likewise, poultry require careful feeding and management practices during the winter months. With the absence of green feeds, the poultryman must watch the diet of his birds to see that all of the necessary elements are contained.

Also important during the cold weather is the winter garden. Many vegetables can be grown in the coldest weather, and these will keep the

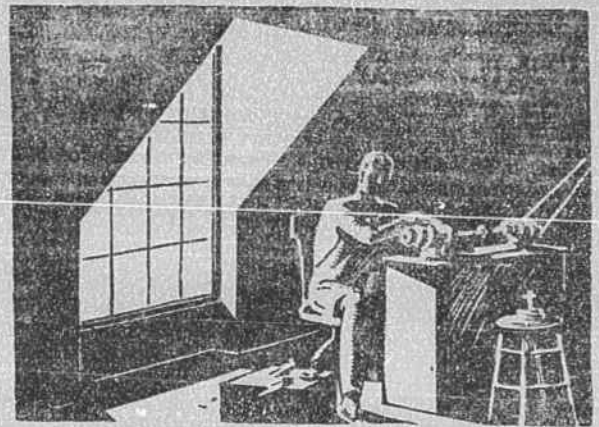
