Record Number of Homicide Cases on Docket of Spring Term Convening April 19; Judge A. Hall Johnston Will Preside

For the first time in the recollection of members of the local bar, the spring term of Watauga superior court, convening for a two weeks' session next Monday, will contain four murder indictments.

Roby Warren, Mabel citizen, indicted for the slaying of Don Jones, Tennessee man, the fatal shot having been fired as the two are alleged to have disagreed, following a drinking party at the home of the accused billard Coffey, who resides on the Linville Road near Blowing Rock, is said to have confessed to the slaying f Raymond Dellinger. Glen Brown is held for the murder of Birchie Potter, and Walter Porter will be tried for casting a stone at Ira Waton with deadly results as the two engaged in a sort of family quarrel.

Thirty-seven other cases are on he state docket, which will be proseouted by Solicitor Spurling, most of the offenses being in connection with lry law violations, the homicides composing the greater part of the elonious slate. About fifty cases are on the civil calendar.

Judge A. Hall Johnston, of Asheville, will preside over the court, it heing one of his first judicial assignments. Judge Johnston was recently appointed by Governor Hoey, followng the resignation of Judge Pender McElroy, who was originally cheduled to come to Boone this
