This will be the second year the contest has been held at Banner Elk. It will be sponsored by Edgar Turts and the management of Pin-macle inn.

cle inn. nacle init. Any fisherman who purchases a regular permit for June 11 and 12, the two days of the derby will be eligible to compete for prizes as well as to take the regular limit per day on fish. Permits for either fly cast-ing or bait fishing may be purchased, bait fishing being limited to certain specified waters. A prize will be swarded for the largest trout taken on artificial lures and for the largest taken on bait.

on artificial lures and for the largest taken on bait. Fly easting contests for accuracy and distance will be held from 1 to 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, June 12. Rods used are to be limited in weight and not over 10 feet in length, while size and length of line is unlimited. The leader must be a minimum of six feet in length. A single 10 fly must be used the point minimum of six feet in length. A single 10 fly must be used, the point of the hook broken off at the end, in the contest for distance casting each participant is allowed three casts for distance. These casts will be averaged, and the contestant hav-ing the best average will be declared winner.
