

Mountaineers Bow To Elon Christians

Greensboro, Oct. 21.—Elon's Christians struck swiftly in the third period here tonight to overcome a six-point lead of the Appalachian Mountaineers and chalk up a narrow 7-6 triumph in an important North State conference game.

Joe Golombek, hard running Elon fullback, thrilled a shivering crowd of 3,000 on this chilly October evening by streaking 45 yards around left end to Appalachian's 20 to set up the Christian touchdown. Vince Kazlow finally rammed it over from the seven-yard line, while Amos Shelton booted the ball neatly over the crossbar to provide the one point winning margin.

Big Len Wilson had provided the big Appalachian punch to carry the boys from the mountains over with their touchdown in the second quarter.

During the entire first half, the Mountaineers consistently outplayed the Christians, but the game turned around in the last two quarters when Elon held the edge throughout, repeatedly remaining in Appalachian territory, constantly threatening.

Elon blew over with its touchdown with the suddenness of a squall. It was shortly after the chukker opened when Golombek smashed over left tackle after taking the ball from Shelton and sliced through a shattered Appalachian line of scrimmage. He ran straight with the power of a locomotive somehow passing all the Mountaineer defenders with Phil Hudson finally riding him down from behind on Appalachian's 20.

NOVEMBER IS VITAL MONTH FOR POULTRY

Poultrymen should be happy during November. Early-hatched pullets should be in full production at that time and old hens carried over either for breeding purposes or for egg production should be coming out of the summer molt and adding their supply to the market eggs.

But poultrymen should think ahead of November profits, warns Prof. Roy S. Dearstyne, head of the poultry department at State College. Winter is approaching and it brings important problems. The mild winter of last year is no guarantee of another mild winter this year, he points out. These are suggestions he makes:

Sufficient litter should be on hand; the windows of the poultry house should be kept intact and in good working order; drop curtains should be available where the open front house is used; nesting material for the season should be on hand; and an ample number of nests should be available for the birds.

Ventilation must be carefully watched from low on. The nights will become quite cold and direct drafts on the birds may lead to serious outbreaks of respiratory diseases, such as colds, roup and bronchitis. If driving rains enter the house, wet litter should be replaced as soon as practical. Prof. Dearstyne advises.

He also recommends increased feeding of mash if autumn neck molt appears on early hatched pullets. An ample number of quality breeding males should be available, and the

flock should be culled at this season of the year. Careful grading of eggs is another vital marketing problem. Finally, records should be kept as a definite measurement of the results of the work.
