Greyhound cuts fares.

H. P. Brawner, general traffic manager of the Atlantic Greyhound lines, has announced widespread bus fare reductions, effective January 16.

The cost of travel to literally thousands of places—large cities and crossroads towns alike—are cut considerably. Since Greyhound transportation, even before the fares were lowered, cost less than any other type of transportation, this new reduction is naturally a matter of more than ordinary interest to all travelers.

The public's reaction to the lower rates will undoubtedly first be reflected in an increase of bus traffic to the Florida and Calif coast resorts.

Although Greyhound has already augmented its service to these mid-winter vacation areas to care for normally increased business at this time of year, it is expected that still further additions will have to be made to handle extra numbers of travelers who will take immediate advantage of the new rate cuts.
