Throngs Gather for Tobacco Celebration

Hardy Brothers firm, lessees of the warehouse.
H. G. Hedrick, of the state department of agriculture, expressed his pleasure at being present while J. M. Broughton, who in private conversation did not deny gubernatorial ambitions felicitated the citizens of the northwest upon their new enterprise.
Thad Eure, secretary of state, journeyed up from Raleigh to bring greetings to the mountain burley growers from the flue cured belt while former Lieutenant Governor R. A. Doughton received an ovation when recognized by the chair. The board of directors of the warehouse, and many other leading citizens throughout the area were recognized.
John Gilmer, Greyhound bus official, spoke briefly and State Senator W. B. Austin introduced Congressman Robert L. Doughton. Mr. Doughton said the burley warehouse was one of the greatest developments for the northwest in the history of its march of progress and called by name a score of citizens who had worked for the new enterprise.
He reviewed the history of tobacco from the time it was found in the New World through the period when it was used as a medical drug and on to the present time when its value of the manufactured product has passed the billion-dollar mark.
North Carolina, he said, produces 52 per cent of all the nation's tobacco. The federal treasury collected \$580,000,000 tax on tobacco last year, he said.
The festival closed Saturday night with a gala tobacco ball promoted for holiday charity.
