### Unique Library Is Built With Aprons

Banner Elk, Dec. 3.—On December 6 an apron bazaar will be held at Grace hospital in the village of Banner Elk. An unusual place for a bazaar, you say. But if you will step into the medical library with its well-filled shelves and hear the story behind the volumes that rest there and of how aprons have made them possible, perhaps you will better understand.

After the death of Dr. R. H. Hardin, beloved member of the Grace hospital staff, in October, 1937, a movement was started to establish a medical library in his memory. Miss Marybeth Hurst, record librarian at the hospital, took the initiative, and under her encouragement friends of Dr. Hardin sent small contributions, and some sent medical books and journals for which they had no need. A room was set aside in the hospital for this use, and it was Miss Hurst's hope and plan that a library might be established which could be used not only by the staff of Grace hospital—which has the distinction of being one of the largest strictly rural hospitals in America—but by all doctors and nurses in the wide area served by it.

In her planning, Miss Hurst was trying to think of some way by which money—badly needed money—might be raised with which to buy even the necessary volumes which were needed to start the library. Near the holiday season, in December of 1938, she conceived a plan of having an apron bazaar, to which all the ladies of Banner Elk and vicinity might be invited, and the proceeds of which would be used for the books and journals so needed. Thus it was that the first apron bazaar for the Dr. R. H. Hardin Memorial Library at Grace hospital was held.

Each year since then a similar bazaar has been held in December, the proceeds of which have been used for this purpose. The library has grown from exactly nothing to almost seven hundred and thirty-eight professional and non-professional magazines and journals. There have been a few gifts—a book here and there, a few subscriptions to magazines which friends have very generously sent—but by far the very great majority of the volumes that rest on the shelves have been bought by "apron money."

### Blowing Rock Man Is Fined \$1,000 In Federal Court

Greensboro, Dec. 3.—Robert Hardin, 30, Blowing Rock resident, was fined \$1000 Monday in U. S. district court after a plea of guilty in violation of the Mann white slave act.

Judge Johnson J. Hayes was unwilling to give Hardin a prison sentence since it appeared this was his first transgression of a serious nature. He was ordered to pay \$500 and \$100 per year for five years. In that five years he will be on

probation and must report regularly to J. Luke Ostern, the court's probation officer.

Hardin was arrested in Winston-Salem in October. He admitted he had taken Miss Arline Nichols of Wilkesboro, to Florida, and had been absent from his home for nine days. No charges were preferred against the young woman.
