

The spring term of Watauga superior court will convene on April 20, for a two weeks session, with Judge Felix Alley of Waynesville, presiding.

About 80 criminal cases are to be tried, according to Austin E. South, clerk of the court. Most of these cases are for the commission of misdemeanors. Of most interest, likely, is the homicide case, in which A. N. Thomas is to be tried on charges of fatally shooting a cousin, B. M.
