APPALACHIAN IS MADE MEMBER OF SOUTHERN ASSN.

Years of Endeavor Crowned With Success as Local College Gets Highest Rating: Members of Faculty Attend Meeting in Memphis

Appalachian State Teachers College was oficially admitted to mem bership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. at an associational meeting held on December 4, thus placing the local institution in the same academic category as Duke, Wake Forest and other leading colleges and universities of the south. This recognition came at the end of four years of effort on the part of Appalachian, during which time its standards were constantly improved, to quali

fy it for association membership.

Dr. Dougherty, president of the college; Dean J. D. Rankin, Dr. Wiley Smith and Professor Chappe Wilson made up the delegation that attended the meeting of the Southern Association in Memphis, Tenn and were instrumental in securing the certification.

The college has been studied from every angle previous to being admitted, chief among these being a study of the graduates of which a survey showed that o't of the approximate two thousand that have graduated two hundred have attended and passed graduate work.

Among the standards required for membership in the Southern Association, which numbers among its members all the leading universities and colleges of the southern states, are: Training of faculty, faculty teaching load, success of graduates in graduate schools, departmental organization, satisfactory teaching load, financial stability, library and satisfactory student and faculty relationship.

Membership in the three accredit-ing agencies entails a wider interest and efficiency on the part of the college in belonging to each of these organizations.
