Shortage Of Feed Prompts Organization Of Farm Cooperative; Sale of Feed Principal Present Activity; Profits Of Store Go to Farmers.

Announcement of the opening of the Watauga Farmers Cooperative Store in Boone on Saturday April 10th, is made in the columns of the Democrat today, thus marking the beginning of an aggressive organi-zation for the benefit of the farmers of this county.

For the present the store will han-dle only feeds and grains, but it is said that ultimately the cooperative will handle everything the farmer needs, and will likely in turn provide facilities for the local marketing of farm products.

The co-op store is located in the Earl Cook building on Depot street and Mr. Grady Tugman, well-known farmer of Meat Camp township is in charge. The store will open promp tly at 9 a. m. Saturday, and two car loads of feed has already been re-

COUNTY FOLLOWS CITY IN MOVE TO BAN BEER, WINE

Board Of Commissioners Resolves to Refuse Issuance of New License for Beer; Ministers In Meeting Thank Boards For Action and Pledge Support.

The Board of County Commissionrs on Monday followed the lead of the city administration and passed a resolution not to issue any license for the sale of wine and beer in Watauga county after April 5, 1943.

At the regular meeting of the Pas-tors and Deacons of the Three Forks and Stony Fork Baptist Associations, held in Boone on Monday, Rev. R. C. Eggers, Rev. W D. Ashley and Rev. N. M. Greene were appointed as a committee to express to the county and city officials their appreciation for this action. The statement issued by the committee follows: "Recently petitions were circulat-

ed in Watauga county addressed to the board of county commissioners requesting that they not issue any more licenses for the sale of wine or beer in Watauga county. Almost four thousand voters of the county signcd these petitions and they were presented to the board of commissoners on the morning of April 5th, 1943. The commissioners adopted a resolution in keeping with the reuest made in the petitions and we hasten to congratulate them upon their stand for righteousness and so briety in the county. We also pledge to them our support in their decision and we ask every citizen of the county to join with them in this endeavor to rid our county of the evils of the sale and consumption of wine and beer. We also desire to express our thanks to the Board of Al dermen and Mayor of Boone, N. C. for their like decision and to them we also pledge our support."
