Lees-McRae College Gets New Dormitory

Banner Elk—Dr. W. C. Tate, president of Lees-McRae College, has just announced the receipt of a gift for the construction of a dormitory at the college. The building, donation of Miss Annie J. Reid, of Orlando, Fla., will be used for young men, and will be known as the Janet M. Reid Memorial Cottage in memory of Miss Reid's mother. In 1938, Miss Reid and her mother jointly gave the W. W. Reid Memorial Cottage, a boys' dormitory, to Lees-McRae College in memory of their husband and father.

This contribution to the college is the latest in a series of donations which have been made since the beginning of its present development program, which started in 1936. During the time which has since elapsed, the college has acquired two dormitories for men, a gymnasium, a fully-equipped vocational arts building, a dairy barn and milk house, three homes for faculty members, and an athletic field partially completed. Also received under this program were the Adelaide Douglas cottage at Grandfather Home for Children, and the Joseph F. Cannon building, also at the orphanage. The development program includes the plans of Lees-McRae College, Grace Hospital and Grandfather Home for Children, all three of which are departments of the Edgar Tufts Memorial Association.

Buildings yet sought for the college, as part of the development program, include an administration building, library, science laboratory and equipment, cold storage plant, and additional faculty homes.

The hospital seeks funds for the erection of a clinic building for its out-patient department, a nurses' home, and additional doctors' homes. Buildings sought by the orphanage include a much-needed recreation building, and a manual training building and equipment for the boys and girls.

Under its program which has been in progress for seven years, is also included the securing of \$1,000,000 for endowment. Buildings, including those already erected, amount to \$500,000, making a total of \$1,500,000 sought by the association for its three departments.
