However, a Republican is entered in each district except the second. Represen-tatives from the first, second, seventh and twelfth districts have one opponent each in the Democratic

John J. Ingle of Winston-Salem got his fee in just ahead of the deadline Saturday as a Republican candidate for the state supreme court seat now held by Associate M. V. Barnhill of Rocky Mount, but was disqualified on a technicality. Associate Justice J. W. Winborne of Marion, will be opposed in the election by Herbert F. Seawell, Jr., of Carthage. Neither incumbent justices is opposed in the Democratic primary.

None of the 11 superior court judges up for re-election will have opposition for the Democratic nominations. Only one Republican filed for this office-Oscar B. Turner of Rose Hill who will oppose Judge H. L. Stevens, Jr., of Warsaw in the sixth district.

Only two Republicans filed for solicitorships—John B. Williams, Jr., oppose J. B. Barker in the sixth and A. E. Hall, of Yadkinville, the Re-publican incumbent in the 17th district in which no Democratic candidate filed.
