SHEEP SHEARING SCHOOL

A sheep-shearing school will be held at Lee Swift's farm on Upper Beaver Dam Thursday, May 23 from 9 a. m. till 3 p. m.

Mr. Warner, who is with the Sunbeam Corporation, formerly the Chicago Flexible Shaft Co., and H. M. Stamey, extension animal husbandry specialist, will conduct the school. Farmers will be shown how to shear sheep, tie wool, and how to sharpen combs and cutters, also how to care for shearing equipment. 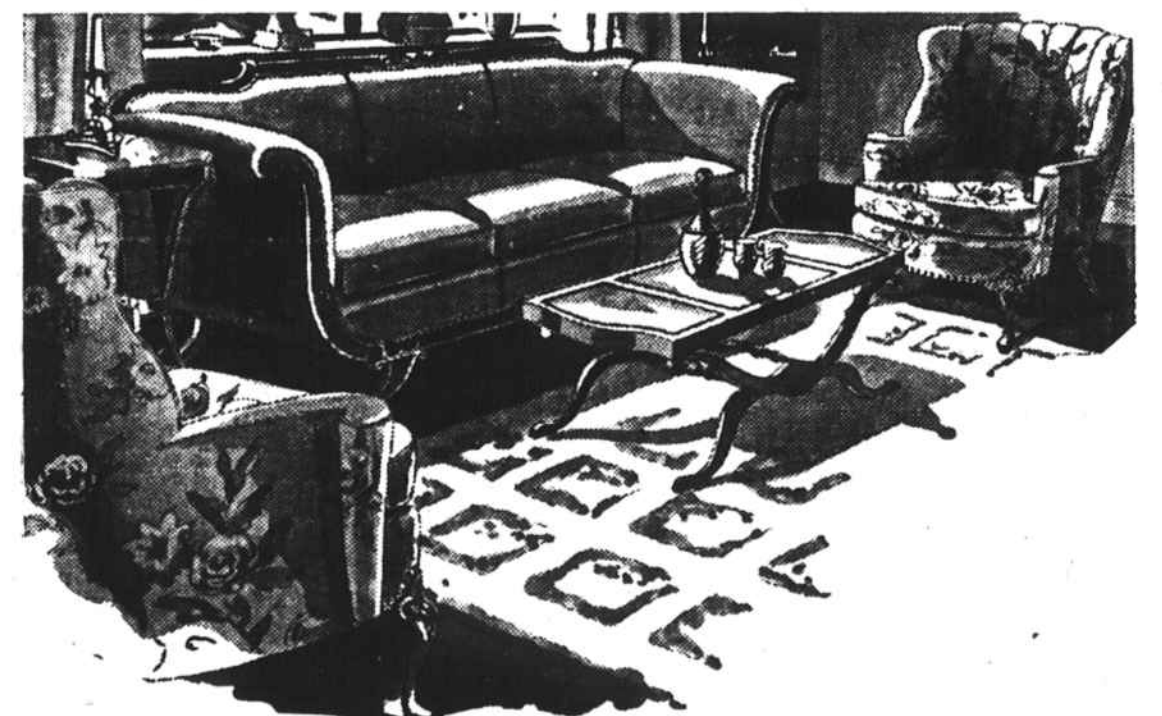
