**Sequoia Potatoes In Strong Demand**

Growers of certified Sequoia potato seed in Avery County are continuing to find a good market for their product in Tennessee, Virginia, and the two Carolinas, reports H. R. Niswonger, in charge of horticulture extension at State College.

In fact, says Niswonger, the growers are unable to meet the demand for their product. They recently sold 7,000 bags of seed potatoes in the four states, and could have sold another 7,000 bags if the potatoes had been available.

Some 15 or more new growers will produce certified seed of this variety in 1950.

A grower in the Vale community, John Calhoun, this year tried the Essex variety, which was developed by the New York Experiment Station for resistance to late blight. He expects to harvest around 500 bushels, Calhoun bought 34 bushels of certified Essex seed in 1948 and produced enough seed to plant 1.7 acres this year.

The Vale farmer also is growing 10 acres of Sequoias and expects to harvest around 20,000 bushels of this variety this year. He is building a storage house which will hold 1,500 bushels of certified seed of Sequoia and Essex.

**WHEAT**

Despite bargain prices put into effect on August 1, less than 10,000,000 bushels of the 168,000,000 bushel lot put on the counter for the year ending July 31, 1950, have been taken by foreign buyers. The price, on September 30, averaged about 45 cents a bushel under what Americans have to pay. The cut-rate price is limited, however, to countries which use their own dollars and which have ratified the wheat agreement.

Cotton growers in North Carolina produced an average of 454 pounds of lint cotton per acre in 1944.

**POLIO IN 1949**

More cases of polio were reported in the first nine months of 1949 than in any full year on record, according to the Public Health Service, which announces that, through September 24, the total was 31,289, compared with 27,659 for all of 1948—second worst year on record—and about 30,000 in 1916, the previous peak.

**MUNICIPAL COSTS**

Municipal government costs of the nation's 37 largest cities—all having more than 250,000 population each—totaled \$2,771,879,000, a rise of 17.2 per cent over 1948, while revenues amounted to \$2,364,502,000, for an increase of 14.2 per cent, according to the Census Bureau.

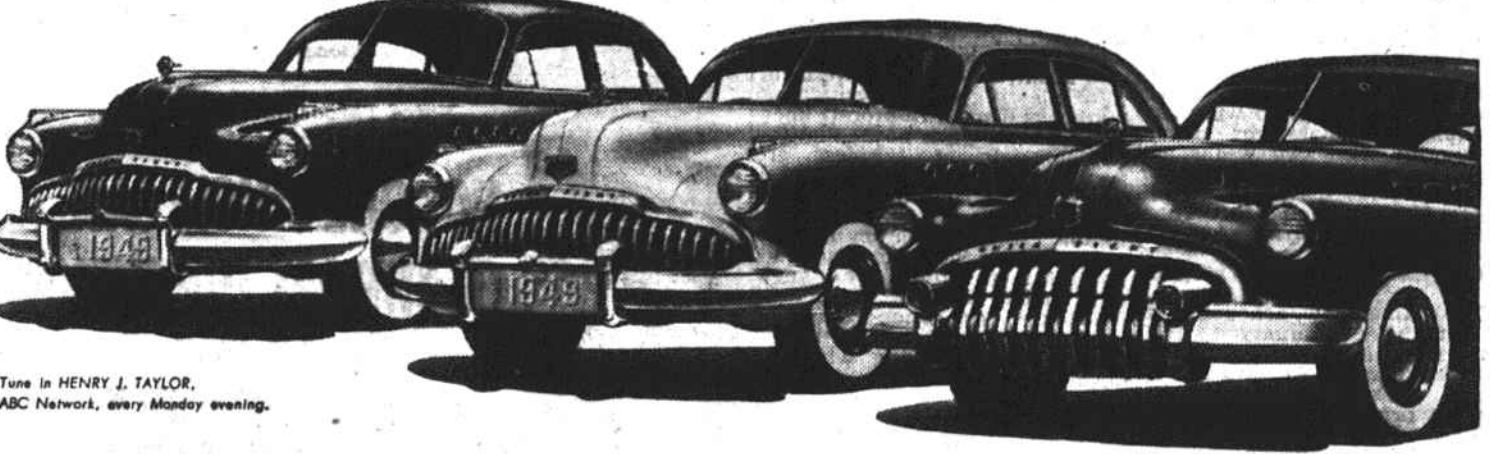
