

BROWN ATTENDS TRAINING COURSE

Mr. James E. Brown, sanitarian for Watauga county, attended the insect and rodent control field training course June 4 through June 8 at the School of Public Health in Chapel Hill. There were only 18 sanitarians from the entire state chosen to attend the course.

The first two days of the course were spent studying flies, dealing with the biology and habits of the domestic fly, fly survey methods, recognition of common flies, and the importance of sanitation in fly control. Much time was spent on insecticides of value in public health programs and types of spraying equipment to control flies, roaches, fleas, mosquitoes, and other household insects.

The next day was taken up with learning about the mosquito survey methods and mosquito control methods.

Domestic rodents and their relation to man was the subject studied for the next day. Habits and characteristics of rats, rat-proofing, and rat killing techniques, and rat ectoparasite control were the next subjects for experiment.

Half of each day was spent out in the field working, spraying dairy barns, fish ponds, eating flies, mosquitoes, and rats.

Mr. Brown feels that because of the work and study put into this course, it will enable us to have a very successful rat and fly control program this summer and better sanitation in the insect and rodent field throughout the county.

four times each Sunday so that the churches could have two services a month.

After two years the progress was apparent. The pastor's salary was raised to \$1,200, and a new roof was put on the parsonage. This was accomplished through a \$300 appropriation by the Board of Missions and contributions from the people of the charge.

At the fourth quarterly conference of the second year under the leadership of Reverend Charlie Kirkpatrick who was Superintendent, it was decided to take Bethel, Fair View, and Pleasant Valley from the Todd Charge. Friendship was also taken from Boone Church and a new charge was made, the Boone Circuit. Five churches thus were left in the Todd Charge, relieving Reverend Stephens of a heavy load and enabling him to give more efficient service to the other churches. The members agreed to raise the pastor's salary fifty per cent in order that this could be done.

For many years the Todd Charge had been a mission charge. At the beginning of this year's conference an every-member canvass was held in some of the churches, and at the first quarterly conference it was found that the pledges which had been made amounted to enough to enable the charge to become self-supporting.

One hundred seventy-six members have been added to the church membership. Funds spent on new building and improvements have amounted to \$38,700. The Board of Missions and Church Extensions made the following donations: \$400 for Blackburn's Chapel; \$300 for Calvary; \$300 for Hopewell; and \$700 for Stephens Memorial. Blackburn's Chapel also received \$250 from the Duke Endowment Fund.

All those who have had a part in this progress and all friends and former pastors are invited to attend these dedication services on Sunday June 17.

Telephone Company Gives Pay Increase

Southern Bell Telephone Company and the Communication Workers of America-CIO on

June 2 in Atlanta reached an agreement on a new contract covering more than 45,000 telephone employees in nine states, including those in Atlanta. The contract runs for one year.

G. D. Garner, Vice-President in charge of personnel for the company, said the contract provides pay increases of approximately 10 per cent in every pay rate, the increases ranging


from \$3.00 to \$7.50 a week, depending on length of service and job classification. The agreement will be submitted to the Wage Stabilization Board for approval. Mr. Garner

said, "Terms of the agreement are believed to be within the board's stabilization formula but because of some doubt as to the meaning of some of its provisions, the board's approval is being requested."
