### General Gains **Endorsement In All Sections**

General Dwight D. Eisenhow er won a victory of landslide pro portions over Governor Adlai Stevenson, as the people of the country rallied to the polls Tuesday, and sharply reversed the twenty year trend to the Demo crats.

On the basis of incomplete returns it would appear that Eisenhower has won near four hundred of the five hundred and thirtyone electoral votes, and that the smashing victory broke sharply into the Democratic ranks in the solid south where Virginia, Florida and Texas were joining in the endorsement of the military commander.

General Eisenhower took the lead with the first returns early Tuesday evening, and his majority constantly increased as returns were tabulated from every section of the country. He won the big industrial states of New York, Massachusetts, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Illinois, swept the farm belt, and outdistanced the Democrats even among the labor had been strongly identified with the party since the first Roosevelt victory.

Pollsters and newspaper men who had predicted a close victory for the General were amazed as State after State and region after region endorsed the Republican ticket and took their places in the Eisenhower "crusade.

Due to the fact that the Democrat goes to press Wednesday morning, the state by state tabulation cannot be used in its final form. However the victory of the Republicans is overwhelming.
