5. Awarded more than 200 scholarships and fellowships in its professional education program.

Mr. King said, "This means that the Watauga County March of Dimes, like the drive in every other county, must enlist more campaign workers to collect more in contributions than ever before in March of Dimes history."

"In addition to assisting four out of five of the record number of polio patients reported in 1952, we continued to aid 46,000 patients stricken in previous years," the campaign director added. "And all of this at a time when science is poised on the threshold of epochmaking discoveries in the field of the prevention of paralytic polio."

### New Park Folder Has Many Changes

Accommodations and attractions built and operated by private enterprise along the Blue Ridge Parkway will get more emphasis in the 1953 folder issued by the Blue Ridge Parkway Association. The association, whose name was changed recently from Blue Ridge Parkway Associated Chambers of Commerce, is comprised of North Carolina and Virginia promotional organizations and privately-owned facilities working in cooperation with the National Park Service, which maintains publicly owned and operated facilities in this most visited of all National Park projects. In the past, public facilities have been listed in bold type. In the new edition, it was decided at a meeting of Association members with Supt. Sam P. Weems of the Blue Ridge Parkway, there will be no distinction in type. Where there is an admission charge, it will be so stated. Importance of the folder is that it is distributed on the Parkway, through regular information outlets, rangers, etc., to millions of visitors.

The new method of listing represents an important change in policy, and indicates greater interest on the part of federal officials in encouraging development of private facilities to serve visitors attracted to the tax-supported Parkway. Manager Arthur Myles Jones of the Asheville Chamber of Commerce is president of the Blue Ridge Parkway Association.

Any farmer who takes in as much as \$500.00 taxable income must file a 1952 Federal Income Tax return even though no tax is due.

least two-thirds of his gross income is from farming. First, he may file the return and pay any tax due by January 31; second, he may file an estimate of the tax due and pay this estimated tax by January 15, and then file a final return by March 15.
