A Clean Stove Saves Fuel



The easy way to clean an oven. Leave a bowl of soapy water and ammonia in the own overnight with the door shut tight. Next morning, suds the interior with a stiff brush. Dirt and grease wash off easily, thanks to pre-softening.

Pour grease off the broller while it is still warm, but let it cool before you soak and scrub it in hot soapsuds. Rub mineral oil on the racks occasionally and they'll resist rust better and longer.

Treat the deep well cooker as you would any adminum lettle. Lift it out and scrub with hot soapsuds, particularly along the outer edges. Non-insulated covers can be tub-washed, but insulated covers ahould just be wiped clean with a damp cloth.
