The following is King Triplett's account of the class visit to the dairy:

Miss Gibbs' fourth grade went to the Hillside Dairy one day last week and learned some very interesting things.

They learned the bottles are washed in five different waters, that the machine that washes the bottles holds 180 bottles, and that besides sterilizing the bottles just in heat, they also use sterilizing powder.

They learned that the milk is strained twice and that one strainer is in a pipe.

They found that pasteurization takes 30 minutes which is longer than homogenization. In pasteurization and homogenization milk is kept at 143 degrees. Before the milk is bottled it has to be under 50 degrees.

After going through the refrigeration room, Mr. Ruffy served the class some freshly made ice cream.

Loans Available For Farm Houses Under Housing Act

The Housing Act of 1949 authorizes the Farmers Home Administration to make loans and grants for construction and repair of farm houses, and other necessary farm buildings.

Loans for periods up to 33 years at 4 percent interest are made to farm owners who are otherwise unable to finance needed housing and other building improvements for themselves and their tenants. The loans are scheduled for repayment at the time of year when he receives his income.

A loan may be made to construct, improve, alter, repair, or replace a house or other buildings essential to the operation of your farm.

To be eligible for a housing loan you must be a farm owner, be unable to get a loan elsewhere, and lack the necessary capital to make the needed improvements. You must also be able to repay the loan from farm and other income. Tenants and farm laborers are not eligible for these loans but owners may borrow money to repair or build houses and other farm buildings for their tenants or laborers.

At the present time there is no credit restrictions on housing loans and it is possible to make a Farm Housing Loan for the full appraisal value of the farm without any down payment by the applicant, preference is given to veterans of all wars and to immediate families of veterans who died in war service.

Applications for farm housing assistance may be made at the office of the Farmers Home Administration, in the county courthouse.
