

# 'Horn' Photo Contest Set For Next Week

The second annual "Hypo Handlers' Highland Fling" will bring an assembly of expert photographers to Boone June 21 and 22 to shoot for \$200 in prize money at photo rehearsals of the outdoor drama "Horn in the West."

Hugh Morton, of Linville, former president of the Carolinas Press Photographers Association and chairman of the annual Southern Short Course in Press Photography at Chapel Hill, is chairman of the event. Invitations have been sent to press and free-lance photographers in six states.

At 7:30 p. m. Sunday, the colorfully costumed cast of "Horn in the West" will begin a run through of the drama on the stage of the Daniel Boone Theatre, stopping in the midst of a scene whenever a photographer requests it. At 9 a. m. on Monday the dress rehearsals will be resumed for daylight pictures.

The visiting lensmen will be guests of the Southern Appalachian Historical Association and Estel Wagner at Blue Ridge Tourist Court, Boone, Sunday night. Before the picture-taking begins Monday morning they will be

guests of the Association and Kirk's Restaurant at a country ham breakfast. They will be served a picnic luncheon at the Daniel Boone Theatre when the morning session ends at noon.

## Kirchner Gets Doctor Degree

Bloomington, Ind.—George F. Kirchner, of Boone was one of the members of the 1953 class to participate June 15 in the 124th annual commencement of Indiana University.

The 1953 class, numbering 2,615, includes students who received their degrees at the University's annual commencement and also those who will complete requirements for degrees in August. In addition, 433 students received their degrees last February, making a total of 3,048 students receiving degrees this year from the Hoosier state university.

## BUTTERMILK—A REFRESHING LUNCHEON TREAT!



A salad of fruit and cottage cheese, homemade nut bread sandwiches and chilled buttermilk is a menu the whole family will enjoy. Buttermilk, that year-round favorite beverage, goes into the making of this nut bread, giving a moist loaf with a delicate flavor, characteristic of buttermilk-made breads and cakes.

**ADA'S NUT BREAD**  
(quick, easy to make and inexpensive)  
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon soda  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts  
1 egg  
2 tablespoons molasses  
1 1/2 cups buttermilk  
3 tablespoons melted butter

Sift together the flour, salt, soda and baking powder. Add sugar and walnuts. Beat egg until thick and lemon-colored. Add molasses and buttermilk. Combine with first mixture along with the melted butter. Stir only to blend ingredients. Do not beat. This will be very thick.

Spoon the mixture into a well-buttered loaf pan, 9x5x3 inches, making slight hollow in center. Let stand 20 minutes before baking. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 60 minutes or until a wooden pick thrust into the center comes out clean. Turn out of pan onto wire rack to cool.

**NOTE:** One-half to three-fourths cup chopped figs, dates or raisins may be added along with the nuts.

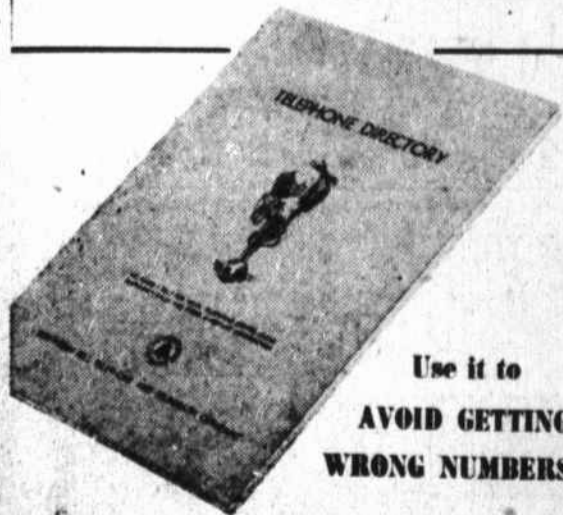

## Special Queen City Bus To Run To Local Theatre

Charlotte.—A new bus schedule connecting Charlotte and other cities with the outdoor drama "Horn in the West" at Boone was announced this week by Queen City Coach Company, of Charlotte.

J. H. Quattlebaum, vice-president in charge of traffic, announced that the new service will go into effect on June 26, opening date of the drama, and operate on Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays throughout the summer.

On those days each week, an express bus will leave the Charlotte terminal at 4 p. m., arriving at the Daniel Boone Theatre at 7:45 p. m. Curtain time for the drama is 8:15 p. m.

The bus will leave Boone at 11 p. m. and arrive in Charlotte at 1:25 a. m.

## MILE-HIGH BLOOMING

Purple rhododendron near the crest of Grandfather Mountain, over a mile high is at its peak this week. This new Blue Ridge Parkway attraction since this is the first blooming season that Grandfather's Peak has been accessible by motor road. The Mile-High Swinging Bridge, dedicated last autumn by Governor Umstead, is also reached by the new motor road to the top of Grandfather, between Linville and Blowing Rock. Mile-high blooming is at its peak at the same time in Craggy Gardens, on the Parkway between Asheville and Mt. Mitchell, and on Roan Mountain, also reached by a new road from Bakersville. The 7th annual Rhododendron Festival is being held atop the Roan June 20-21.

## HOLDUP FAILS

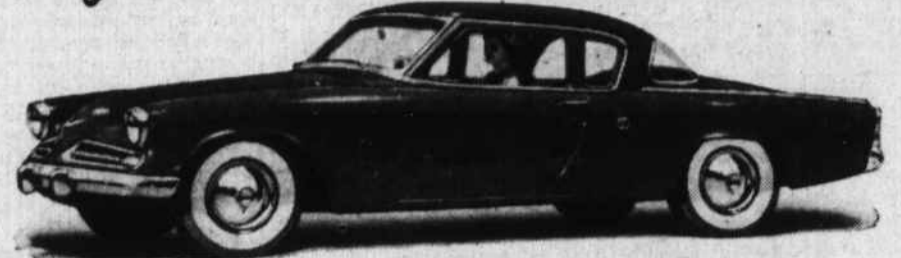

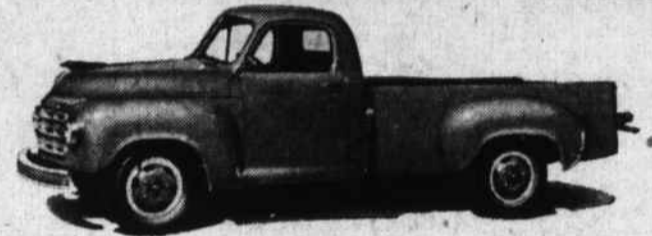
