Harris Quits Realty Concern

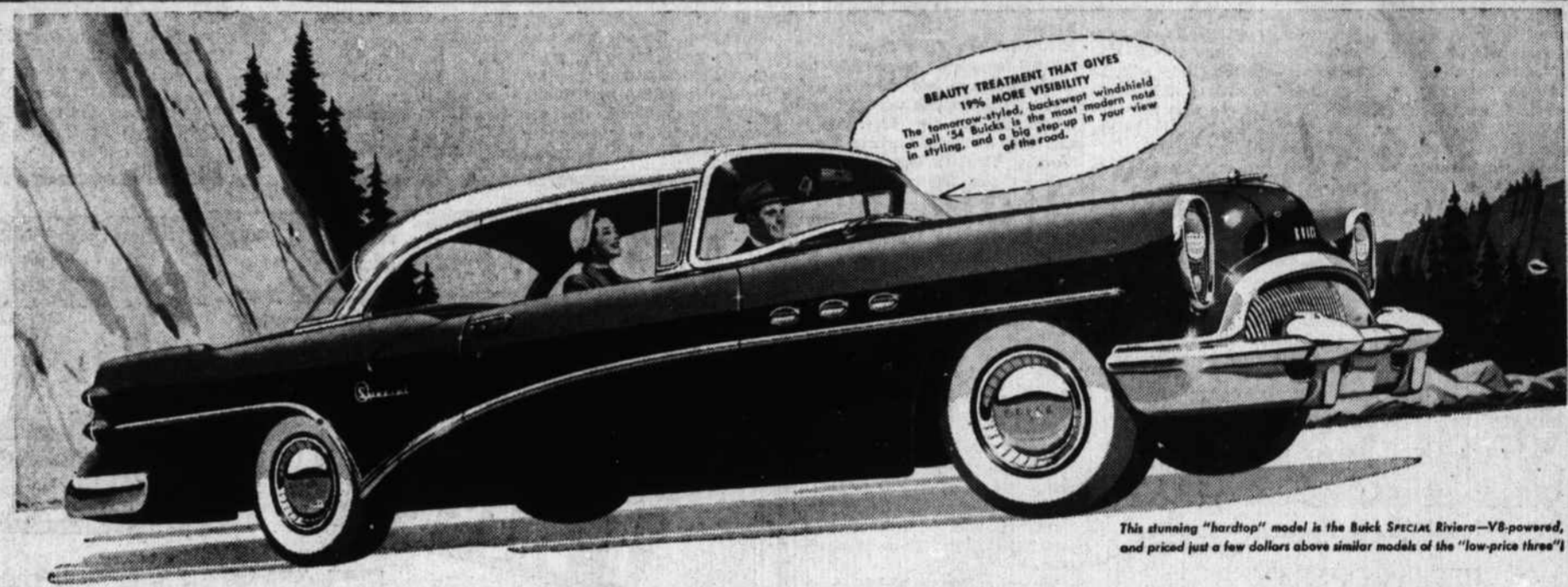
Stanley A. Harris, for the past three years connected with the Home Realty Company, has sold his interest to H. Gady Farthing and W. H. Gragg.
