

Miss Wilson Takes Top Honor In Lamb Show

Joan Wilson, 4-H club member and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wilson of Reese, took top honors in fitting and showmanship in the Tri-County Junior Lamb Show, held Monday at Sparta. Watauga, Ashe and Alleghany counties participate in the show.

The same lamb Miss Wilson used for the showmanship entry won first place in the registered ewe lamb class.

Watauga County placed third in the group of five lambs class. Having lambs in this group were Johnny Vines, Robert Wilson, and Henry Hayes.

Thirty-nine lambs were shown from Watauga, out of the total of 90 from the three counties. Exhibitors included both Future Farmers of America and 4-H club members.

Glenn Ray Conklin of Ashe County took grand champion honors with his entry. Entries by him also placed first in the class of lambs sired by registered Hampshire, rams and first and third in the big show group of individual entries from which the champions were selected.

Roger Collins of Sparta was awarded reserve champion honors.

In the auction sale that followed the show, Mr. Conklin's grand champion commanded 45 cents per pound and the reserve champion was bid off at 38 cents a pound.

Assisting with the show were W. C. Richardson, assistant county agent of Watauga; Eugene Gray, assistant agent for Ashe; John Cooper, Alleghany assistant agent; and Sam Buchanan, state extension livestock specialist.

Assisting the 4-H and FFA boys and girls of Watauga prepare for the show were R. G. Shipley, vocational agriculture teacher at Cove Creek, and Mr. Richardson.

The show is sponsored annually by the State Extension Service, business and professional men of the three counties, and the American Hampshire Sheep Association.
