

G. O. P. Has Convention

Durham—North Carolina Republicans apparently were solidly behind President Eisenhower last week after one of their best shows of strength at a state convention.

More than 2,500 of the party faithful gathered here Saturday to hear Gov. Theodore McKeldin of Maryland. They picked four at-large delegates to the national convention, named Kyle Hayes of North Wilkesboro as the GOP candidate for governor and unanimously adopted an eight-point platform.

Named at-large delegates were Ray Jennings of Taylorsville, J. E. Broyles of Lenoir, Mrs. Lewis G. Rogers of Charlotte and Charles G. Owen of Asheville. All pledged their votes to Eisenhower.

Twenty-four other delegates to the national convention were picked at district conventions. None was instructed as to how he should vote.

Jennings was named by acclamation as state chairman and Broyles was elected for another term as national committeeman. Mrs. Rogers was elected national committeewoman 1,015 1/2 - 891 1/2 over Mrs. Sallie Wilkinson Blanchard of Kannapolis. Mrs. William Preston Few of Durham chose not to run for national committeewoman, a post she had held many years.

The platform, submitted by J. Marvin Glance of Asheville, wholeheartedly commended the Eisenhower administration and called for an end of 85 years of Democratic rule in North Carolina.

Melvin Mattingly of Bardonia liked the big town but confided to me that he would rather live on his father's farm—which was what he is planning to do anyway. He thought a trained blind person could farm all right.

Another group now approached, and I found they were boys from the West Virginia School for the Blind at Romney. A nice bunch of fellows, they talked freely and Earl Jackson of near Welch, West Va. said he could use more time in seeing this place. Arthur Burnside from near Princeton felt that the UN was the prettiest place he ever "saw." Jerry Woolwine and Willie Aldrich, both of whom live not far from Welch, felt much at home here—and I told them we wanted them all to stay as long as possible.

Paul Langan began to get his boys together in order to board the train for home. By his kind yet firm manner, one could see that he understood blind people and liked to work with them. His school is evidently doing greatly

beneficial work. As the blind boys from Kentucky and West Virginia left, I had a lump in my throat. Here was a group, greatly handicapped, but you would hardly know it had they not had to be led and feel their way around. It seemed to me that no visitors ever saw more in New York—and I'm sure none ever appreciated it more than these fine young gentlemen.
