## Baptist Hour To Be Observed

The Perkinsville Baptist Church will join with congregations of almost 30,000 churches of the Southern Baptist Convention to celebrate "Baptist Hour Sunday" May 27th, in observance of the 15th anniversary of "The Baptist Hour" on the air, it was announced by Rev. Rex W. West, pastor of the church.

The observances will unite more than a million members of Southern Baptist congregations in a nationwide "Prayer-for-Peace" on Baptist Hour Sunday, May 27th, and more than a thousand churches, including the Perkinsville Baptist Church here, playing a special anniversary record at evening services.

It was pointed out by Rev. Mr. West, and by Paul M. Stevens, Director of the Radio and Television Commission, that the "Baptist Hour Sunday" "Prayer-for-Peace" of more than a million Baptists is a moving affirmation of faith and the power of prayer for the welfare of men everywhere.

"The reliance on faith and spiritual background by international leaders and all men, in times of stress and crisis", Stevens stated, "is demonstrated in the special Anniversary Record". The record will be played to the congregation of Perkinsville Baptist Church at special "Baptist Hour Sunday" evening services as part of a similar program in over 1000 Southern Baptist churches observing the radio program's 15th anniversary.

"The record", Rev. Mr. West said, "traces the history of "The Baptist Hour" from its 1941 beginning with 16 stations in 11 states to 375 stations reaching over 20 million people in 32 states, Hawaii, Canal Zone, Puerto Rico, the Philippines, and other areas in Southeast Asia."

## FHA Official Visits County

Ralph Turner, farm management specialist from the state office of the Farmers Home Administration in Raleigh, recently visited the county FHA office in Boone. The purpose of Mr. Turner's visit was to study the progress that Farmers Home Administration borrowers have made since receiving their loans and to study ways that FHA credit can help farmers under the Rural Development program now being formed.

In Mr. Turner's study, it was noted that the families who had received real estate loans to purchase and develop farms had had their loans on an average of 6.1 years. The average net worth of this group had increased from \$3699 at the time they received their loan, to an average of \$5330, at the present time, representing an increase of 44%. The average gross income of this group had increased 30% and the standard of living had increased 71%.

In the group of farm families receiving loans for operating purposes, it was found that the average family had had their loans 2.6 years. The average net worth of this group had increased from \$7455, at the time they received their loan to \$9956, at the present time for an increase of 34%. This same group showed an increase of 25% in gross income and 19% in standard of living since receiving their loans.

## Says Citizens Aiding Navy

The Navy recruiting station in Lenoir announced this week that North Carolina citizens are cooperating fully with the Navy recruiters after being called upon by Governor Luther H. Hodges to offer their assistance to the recruits.

Governor Hodges designated May as Navy Sign-Up Month and called upon the citizens of North Carolina to assist Navy recruiters throughout the State to procure the assigned quota of men so that our Navy will always remain our first line of defense.
