 ones will teach you lessons which you cannot learn in any college or from any professor and you will be forever drawing upon your own resources of mind and character, your human understanding, your resilience and adaptability in meeting the unforeseen and wholly unforeseeable situations that will confront you every day.

When a carpenter is building a house, he can look at the finished job and say with pride "I built that house"; and when a lawyer wins a case he can say: "I protected my client's interests."
 But the thoughtful teacher never knows that he has performed his duties well until the task itself has long since been done and his pupils have made their places—good, bad, or mediocre—in the world of work and accomplishment.

Yes, you have chosen a wearing, wearying, commanding profession. But for all that teaching is a glorious, even holy profession. It has rewards and satisfactions that no other calling offers and that cannot be measured in dollars or in public acclaim or in the pomp and circumstances of office. Saint Paul broke with the upbringing of his youth, but he never forgot that he had sat at the feet of a great teacher.

You will have the golden opportunity to quicken and furnish the minds of children, to enable their thoughts, to shape their characters, to fix the course of their lives. To your work there is a touch of immortality. When you build purpose and mental awareness and moral perception and stamina into a child, you build something that endures for his lifetime and is transmitted for his children as their inheritance from a cultured home.

To those of you who are entering the teaching profession I extend my heartiest congratulations and my sincerest commendation, and my warm personal thanks as a private citizen of North Carolina. You have, I truly believe, selected the most beneficent, the most genuinely satisfying, even the noblest of all secular professions. May the Lord who gave to humanity the Greatest of All Teachers bless you in your work!

Plemmons, president of Appalachian State Teachers College, who presided at the exercises, announced that the senior class at its last meeting yesterday had elected as permanent officers the following: Billy Ray Soffley of Mocksville, president; John Maurice Lovett of Millers Creek, vice president; Betty Huffman of Marion, secretary; and Margaret Goodman of Union, S. C., treasurer. On behalf of the senior class, Mr. Soffley presented to Dr. Plemmons for the college the first contribution the college had ever received toward the establishment of a living endowment. In addition to a check of \$187.50, the seniors pledged \$1,114 to be paid to this purpose before the end of the next school year. This living endowment is to be used to make it possible for worthy and needy students who wish to become teachers to attend Appalachian State Teachers College. Dr. Plemmons called this gift "one of the most momentous steps this institution has ever taken."

 was there, too—some to remember Tweetsie's past, others to cheer for the first time, but all to cheer and applaud her homecoming.

Plenty of music and entertainment was supplied for the hour-long program by the Lenoir Rhyne College Band, the Hickory High School Band, the Boone High School Band, television cowboy Fred Kirby, and the "Twilighters," a vocal group of young ladies from Charlotte.

It was Tweetsie's big day. As she came to a stop at the trackside platform, students from various high schools in the area stepped from her lead coach dressed in costumes fashionable in the 1890's, so the little vintage choo-choo would feel right at home.

Tweetsie got her start back in 1886, but was put out of service when the 1940 floods washed away the tracks between Boone and Johnson City, Tenn.

Then, about three years ago, a group of Virginians bought the little train and used her to carry excursion passengers over a one-mile stretch of the Shenandoah Central Railroad. The venture didn't pay, so Tweetsie was put up for sale, again.

Gene Autry, the cowboy star, put in a bid and wanted to take her to Hollywood, but the deal fell through, and Tweetsie was finally bought by Mr. Robbins. Introduced by Hickory Mayor Donald S. Menzies, Governor Hod-

ges said Tweetsie would prove to be a big tourist attraction, and said there are four things North Carolinians can concentrate on to promote tourist business in the state—good food, comfort and hospitality, friendliness, and cleanliness.
