at least aggravated by extremes in weather conditions—either by periods of dry weather or periods of excessive rainfall. In periods of dry weather it can be held in check by providing irrigation; however, don't wait until you have lost a large percentage of your tomatoes, but irrigate as soon as lack of sufficient moisture is evident. Mulching plants with a deep layer of straw will prevent loss of moisture from the soil and will cut down on the amount of blossom-end rot.

In the mountain area it will be necessary to control late blight if you wish to be successful with tomatoes. This is the same disease that attacks Irish potatoes. Use a copper spray such as tribasic copper sulphate or copper A compound and keep the plants well covered.

Don't forget to prepare for a good fall garden. If you have not already done so, sow seed as soon as possible for broccoli, cauliflower, collard and cabbage plants. These may be grown in flats or boxes for transplanting to pots or tin cans for later transplanting to the field. Broccoli and cauliflower require more boron than is found in most of our soils. Boron deficiency causes hollow stems and an internal browning. To prevent this, mix two level tablespoons of common borax with the fertilizer for 100 feet of row.

Three good fall garden crops are Chinese cabbage, kohlrabi and leaf lettuce. These crops are not found commonly enough in our fall gardens. Head lettuce does not do as well in the fall as leaf lettuce. A good variety is "Salad Bowl."

There is still time to plant bush snapbeans and small butterbeans for a fall crop. Try Wade, Tendergreen, Seminole or Topcrop varieties of snapbeans and Henderson Bush or White Butterpea of the small butterbeans.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that SPECIAL ELECTION will be held in the Town of Boone, North Carolina, on the 11th day of September, 1956, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said Town, for their approval or disapproval, the following proposition:

Shall the qualified voters of the Town of Boone approve the bond ordinance which was adopted by the Board of Commissioners of said Town on June 21, 1956, and which (1) authorizes bonds of said Town of the maximum aggregate amount of \$75,000 to finance the cost of enlarging and extending the water supply system maintained and operated by said Town to supply water to said Town and its inhabitants, and (2) authorizes the levy and collection of an annual tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds; and also approve the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of said bonds?

The polls for said election will open at the hour of 6:30 o'clock, A. M., and will close at the hour of 6:30 o'clock, P. M., Eastern Standard Time. The polling place for said election shall be the usual polling place in the Town of Boone, to-wit: Town Hall.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Boone has appointed Elsie Hagan to act as Registrar, and C. C. Greene, Jr. and Mrs. W. G. Hartzog to act as Judges of Election for said election.

The Registrar will be furnished with the registration book used at the last regular election held in the Town of Boone (being the regular municipal election held on May 3, 1955) and he will revise the registration book so that it will show an accurate list of the electors previously registered in the Town and still residing therein, without requiring such electors to register anew. The Registrar will keep the registration book open for the registration of new electors on each day (Sundays and holidays excepted) for the period beginning Friday the 24th day of August, 1956, and ending on Friday, the 31st day of August, 1956. The book will be kept open on each Saturday during such period from 9 o'clock A. M., until 9 o'clock P. M., and on other days during such period from 9 o'clock A. M., until 5 o'clock P. M.

Travel Survey Is Half Done

Raleigh—The Highway Commission reported this week that it has recently passed the half-way mark in its special three-month travel survey of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

Since the survey began June 6, a total of 15,000 vehicles have been stopped and their occupants interviewed. The midway report showed a total of 51,690 people in 15,000 cars, giving an average of 3.44 passengers per car.

A six-man interview team has been rotating its interviewing between the three exit points of the park—at Smokemont, N. C., and Gatlinburg and Townsend, Tenn.

The midway report showed that on weekdays 74 per cent of the total motorists interviewed come from the following 10 states:

Tennessee 25.8 per cent; Ohio 8.9; North Carolina 6.9; Florida 6.5; Illinois 5.6; Georgia 4.7; Indiana 4.5; Michigan 4.2; Kentucky 4.0; Alabama 3.1.

This most extensive travel survey ever made in Tennessee and North Carolina will evaluate the future demands for both needed highway improvements and tourist accommodations within a 50-75 mile radius outside the park.

Ulysses S. Grant had always been a Democrat until he was nominated on the Republican ticket. Before the Civil War, he had been cashiered out of the Army and after trying other work unsuccessfully, he was so down-and-out, he had to pawn his watch in St. Louis for Christmas presents for his family in 1852. The longest convention was held by the Democrats in 1924 when it took 103 ballots to nominate John W. Davis. On the other hand, George Washington was nominated unanimously on the first vote.

And so it goes. Our Presidents have been mainly men with few enemies, who were in the right place at the right time. Fortunately, our Constitution is still so fitting and effective in most ways, that whoever is nominated and elected is apt to be a pretty good man who will be a credit to the past and a pilot for our future.



PRICE-FIXING

Government trust investigators concentrated on cases of asserted price-fixing during the first six months of this year, according to the Justice Department. Since Jan. 1, the department's Anti-trust Division has filed twenty-nine anti-trust cases, thirteen of them for civil violations and sixteen on criminal charges. The department also terminated 36 anti-trust cases in the first half of 1956, one third of which were based on criminal charges and the rest on civil actions.

Government reports continued gains in the economy.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has reported the fixing of a single variety of common wheat, Chinese Spring, with resistance to 22 races of wheat rust (of which 18 has been tested).
