SHOES SELECTION AND FIT-TING The doctors who have given time and thought to the study of feet give a word of warning to the ones who don't now have ailing and mal-shapened feet, es pecially to younger women and girls.

A recent fashion magazine says that as a reliable guide to the proportions of the individual foot, many stores rely on a foot measure because no two feet are identical. Indeed, even the right and left foot show variations in each indi-vidual. Not only width and length are measured, but much more important, the length from heel to ball joint. Both feet are measured to take into account the slight difference in length between right and left foot. The well-trained shoe man knows how to judge from these measurements, the siz and type of shoe for best appearance and comfort. He knows that the widest part of the shoe must come at the ball joint.
